Window to Holiness

A LIGHT TO THE HEAVENS

When people first walk into St. Vincent's, they generally notice two things right away: the sanctuary and the stained glass windows. All the sight lines in the church lead to the sanctuary. At the same time, as soon as the person lifts his or her eyes, the windows come to the fore. With the deep cobalt panes and the lives of the saints lining the walls, it's as if they are leading us to the very altar. The windows tell a beautiful story, revealing to us the path to the heavenly sanctuary, where the saints stand and praise the Lord for all eternity.

There's one window, in particular, that exemplifies this whole story. Above the main entrance to the church rests the great rose window. Here, we see the saints, choirs of angels, symbols of the Dominican Order, and mysteries of the Rosary. There's a beautiful harmony at play in the design of the whole window. For at the bottom, we have the original three sets of mysteries of the Rosary. As the eye passes upwards, it moves from the joyful mysteries to the sorrowful mysteries and finally to the glorious mysteries. It's as if we are passing through the life, death, and resurrection of Christ into the heavenly realm, where we see the saints and angels depicted above.

At the center of the rose, St. Dominic sits, surrounded by seraphim, symbolizing divine love. Outward from him radiate some of the exemplars of the Dominican life: St. Thomas Aquinas, St. John of Cologne, St. Catherine of Siena, St. Raymond of Peñafort, St. Peter Martyr, and St. Antoninus, each surrounded by a different choir of angels which relates to the life of the particular saint.

It is important to see these two sections as being built one upon the other for the window as a whole reveals the path to heaven. It begins with entering into Christ's mysteries. Through meditating on the life, death, and resurrection of Christ in the Gospels, the Rosary, and the Stations of the Cross, we begin to be shaped more and more like Christ. As we are transformed by those mysteries and appropriate their graces, we begin to put on Christ. We start to live in holiness. It's that transformation, that union with Christ, and that path to holiness, which then leads us to the upper part of the window where we see the heavenly court. The saints and angels gather around the throne of God, and we, too, are invited into their company so that we might rest with the Lord and with them for all eternity in the perfect light of heaven. As we hear in Revelation, "The city had no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gave it light, and its lamp was the Lamb" (Revelation 21:23).

A LIGHT FOR OUR LIVES

In seeing this profound theological insight intermingled with a remarkable artistic design, we are led to contemplate one more aspect of this window. Unlike the comparable theological artistic depiction of the Rosary and the heavenly court in the reredos of the chapel at the Dominican House of Studies in Washington, this window is not located above the high altar. Rather, here, this window is placed above the main entrance. Why is that?

This is about the transformative effect that should happen in the church and what it leads to in our lives. When we come in through the entrance and underneath the rose window, we enter into this reality and should partake of the graces that the Lord wants to offer us in these hallowed walls. Likewise, when we go forth from the church back into the world, we should have been transformed and so more easily live out the virtues of the Rosary and exemplified by the saints. In other words, our time in the church is an invitation to transformation, a transformation of beauty and holiness. Heading into the world, we should be witnesses of the power and reality of the Gospel, hopefully leading others to the light of the Gospel too.

As we approach the Solemnity of the Assumption this week, may our meditation on the mysteries of the Rosary be a means to beautify our souls, witness to others, and lead us to heaven!

MUSIC NOTES

Gregorio Allegri was a Roman Catholic priest, singer, composer, and brother of fellow composer Domenico Allegri. He sang as a chorister at the Roman Church of St. Luigi dei Francesi, under Giovanni Bernardino Nanino, brother of Giovanni Maria Nanino. After ordination, he was first stationed at the Cathedral of Fermo where he composed a large amount of sacred music that gained the approbation of Pope Urban VIII. He was *maestro di cappella* of the Church of Santo Spirito in Sassio, Rome, before being appointed a singer in the Sistine Chapel choir in 1629. There he remained, eventually becoming *maestro* two years before his death.

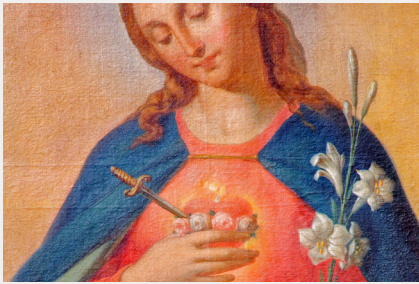

Assumption

The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a **Holy Day of Obligation**. We will have a **Solemn Mass at 6 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer** for which the Schola Cantorum will sing *Missa Che fa oggi il mio sole* by Gregorio Allegri and *Assumpta est Maria á 5* and *Salve Regina á 6* by Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina.

The 11:45 AM Dominican Healthcare Mass at St. Catherine of Siena will be offered as usual. The evening Masses on Thursday, August 14 will be for the Vigil of the Solemnity and will satisfy the obligation.

The Thursday evening Holy Hour at St. Catherine of Siena will take place as usual.

The Assumption is one of the oldest feasts of Our Lady and is prayed as the Fourth Glorious Mystery of the Rosary.

In 1950, in the Apostolic Constitution *Munificentissimus Deus* (Most Bountiful God), the Venerable Pope Pius XII proclaimed the Assumption of Mary a dogma of the Catholic Church: "The Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heaven." Rather than introducing a new belief, *Munificentissimus Deus* infallibly asserted the veracity of the Assumption, tracing the ancient traditions with which the Church has observed the feast since at least the 5th century in the East.

The Constitution also cited testimonies from the early Church Fathers and considered the history of theological interpretation of Scripture. For example, Mary is traditionally identified as the "woman clothed with the sun" in the Book of Revelation, Chapter 12. And the 8th century theologian St. John of Damascus wrote, "It was fitting that she, who had kept her virginity intact in childbirth, should keep her own body free from all corruption even after death," and "that she, who had carried the creator as a child at her breast, should dwell in the divine tabernacles."

As Mary's tomb was in Jerusalem, that city is commonly credited as the location of the Assumption; but some argue in favor of Ephesus.

In Eastern Churches, August 15 is known as the Dormition (falling asleep) of Mary and is preceded by a two-week period of fasting which is similar to Lent.

Following the example of other Dominican parishes, we will begin using a new rolling system for scheduling announced Mass intentions starting August 18, 2025.

Rather than opening the entire year's Mass Book all at once, we will now open it one month at a time on a twelve-month rolling basis. This means parishioners will be able to schedule Masses throughout the year, as new months become available.

On August 18, 2025, the Mass Book for January 1 through July 31, 2026, will open. After that, a new month will open on the first of each month. For example, on September 1, 2025, Masses for August 2026 will become available, and so on.

We hope this new system will provide more timely opportunities to have Masses offered for your loved ones. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to reach out.
