Showing Up Anyway

The Epiphany of the Lord celebrates the incomparable wonder of Divine Revelation, that gift by which we know God and His Plan in ways we could not have discovered by our own efforts. The star-illumined trek of the magi reveals the way in which God has opted for self-disclosure. Paradoxically, the sages journey into the unknown, yet they are guided through it. They seek an unfamiliar person in an unfamiliar country, but their bright beacon gives a clear path. Further, any gazer at the heavens might have observed this star and its movements.

The whole series of Christmas mysteries: Annunciation, Visitation, Nativity of John the Baptist, Nativity of Jesus, Epiphany, Presentation, and Baptism of the Lord follow this same pattern of divine manifestation. God intervenes in the lives of ordinary people, not to take them out of the ordinary, but to shed new light on what the ordinary means. Jesus, Mary, Joseph, and John the Baptist occupy privileged places in the plan of God and yet He spares them no hardship, rather He enables them to meet it and endure it faithfully with a view to the goal that has been shown to them.

But in the plan embodied by Christ ordinary life comprises more than faithful endurance. He has laid a foundation of grace, and resting on it our lives of commitment become an engine of witness and transformation. Jesus has bequeathed us a religion in which "showing up" makes clear that we, in our weakness and sinfulness, nevertheless have a source enabling us to keep on. Here, I believe is the truest Christian testimony. People know Jesus lives not because I am sinless, but because I am public about being a sinner who drinks constantly from a fountain of mercy.

Keeping on despite myself grows in me patience and perseverance, compassion and hope. Such reorientation happens concretely through the practice of a discipline. Showing up provides the practical backbone of marriages, religious life, and priesthood, and indeed parish membership and service. On the outside showing up looks pedestrian but actually it brings us to the frontiers of our humanity. Appearing for my committees, appearing for Mass, indeed appearing for breakfast seems so basic that we miss the challenge that just keeping appointments offers day in, day out.

Showing up is what I do when I do not feel like it, and it is the means by which I challenge the supremacy of my moods. When I commit to showing up I go anyway: I may be angry, or distracted, or unprepared, but I said I would be there and so I am. Of course it is wonderful to be fully alive, aware, and focused, but in our humanity often we are not. When we show up anyway, God does wonderful things with our deficiencies.

Preaching demands a daily showing up, and I signed on for a lifetime of it. Preparing for it offers real delight, and giving a thought through homily imparts true serenity to the soul. But what happens when I prepare the wrong readings (thinking it was Monday), or I have a bad cold, or there has been an emergency? At such times Mass must still be said, and some words must still be offered. Here, I rely on my dictum that if I prepare when I am able, God makes it work when I am not. I have been amazed at the words that came out of my mouth when I had no words ready.

This truth of my Dominican life, or of any committed Christian life, comes alive to me as I prepare to preach a retreat for our Brothers who will make Solemn Vows this year. They will promise to show up "until death" in our way of life. They can see the world is changing, and they must realize that over the decades they will change. Nevertheless they pledge themselves to a life of constancy. How many times over all those years will they fall apart on the inside, even as they keep the schedule on the outside? Who can say what amazing personal growth and apostolic fruit will come from their perseverance through the narrow places. The world is complex and we are complex, but the schedule is clear, and sometimes it is the star we follow in the darkness.

We might well ask what will be the source for decades of showing up anyway, but perhaps the better question is, "Who?" The one who will help them face the day each day is the same one who launched them into the life.

The life of preaching offers one face of the whole Christian life, and their are countless others, each tracing itself back to the Holy Spirit's intervention at Pentecost. He makes each member of Christ's body vibrant with a source deeper than either intellectual clarity or moral rectitude. The source lies in the True Vine, of which we are the branches, Jesus Christ (See John 15). In St. John's teaching on the Vine the Lord indicates that each living branch of him will be pruned so that it bears more fruit. I think that when we find ourselves showing up anyway pruning is in progress. From the pruning come intellectual and moral growth, and a deeper thriving.

Each of our lives will see distracted periods, drab periods, and dark periods. With God these become moments of growth that continue the mystery of the Epiphany. Christ is known because his followers find in him a strength by which they become strong themselves.

Sunday, January 5, The Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord

This celebration weaves together three recognitions of Jesus as Son of Mary and as Divine Son of God; the Adoration of the Magi, the Lord's Baptism in the Jordan, and the Wedding at Cana. This antiphon from Morning Prayer for this feast shows you the whole mystery in all its parts.

Today the Church has been joined to her heavenly bridegroom since Christ has purged her of her sins in the River Jordan: the Magi hasten to the royal wedding feast and offer gifts: the wedding guests rejoice since Christ has changed water into wine, alleluia.

- Pray that our contemporaries also may recognize the Christ who is the healer of body and spirit, the teacher of the mind, and the bridegroom of the soul.
- Pray for the beneficiaries of this week's second collection,
- The communications efforts of our Archdiocese and our Bishops' Conference, and
