OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE - ST. JUAN DIEGO

This year, the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe (December 12) is superseded by the Third Sunday of Advent. Therefore, the Parish will instead have a Sung Mass and Procession to the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe on Thursday, December 9 at 6 рм at St. Vincent Ferrer. This is the Feast day of St. Juan Diego, the Mexican peasant to whom the Blessed Virgin appeared on Tepeyac hill in Mexico City. Canonized by Pope John Paul II in 2002, Juan Diego is the first Catholic saint indigenous to the Americas.

MISA DEL GALLO AND ADVENT NOVENA

The Parish will offer a Novena of Masses in honor of Our Lady of the Expectation from December 17-24. A special early morning Mass, known as the Misa de Gallo, will be offered each of these days at 6 AM at St. Vincent Ferrer. The intention during this Novena is for the safety of children.

RECONCILIATION MONDAY

Monday, December 20 is Reconciliation Monday throughout the Archdiocese, an opportunity for all to make their confession before Christmas. Confessions will be heard at both churches from 11 AM-1 PM. Music Notes

Over the preceding fall Sunday of Ordinary Time, the organ voluntaries have been by English composers. Many of the postludes were in the form of a march, similar in style and structure to the famous *Pomp and Circumstance* of Edward Elgar. Several large organ building companies active in the later half of the 19th century, including Henry Willis and Sons, Harrison and Harrison, Norman and Beard, and William Hill and Sons, crafted grand instruments for the Cathedrals of England. Many of these masterpieces can still be heard today. Composers such as Herbert Brewer, Charles Stanford, Herbert Howells, and Elgar wrote colorful, symphonic music to utilize these technologically advanced organs. Some voluntaries, like last Sunday's Orb and Sceptre by William Walton, were actually transcriptions of pieces originally conceived for orchestra.

Last year, we surveyed the works of Bach. This coming spring, we will consider the music of Felix Mendelssohn and some 20th century French music. The voluntaries for Advent will be specifically of the season.

Next weekend, for the Second Sunday of Advent, the Schola will sing music the Spanish Renaissance.

Advent - The Beginning of our Conformity to Christ

Saints Balderdash. That was a staple game for the annual Catholic New Year's Party at the Dominican House of Studies while I was in formation. Each year on the Vigil of the First Sunday of Advent, we would have a party to celebrate the beginning of the new liturgical year when everything started fresh again. Instead of a ball dropping to the timing of midnight, we would kick off the new year with Vespers and a celebratory meal. Entering into a little bit of the spirit of penance that can come with Advent (yes, not just Lent but also Advent has penitential elements), we would have sparkling grape juice rather than nice wine. We would then spend time in recreation with Catholic versions of different popular games.

While this was a lighthearted entrance into the Catholic new year, there is something so profound about having a new year's celebration for the Church. Just like with New Year's Day when so many people try and begin things anew (albeit dieting usually doesn't start until January 2), there is great reason to view the beginning of the Church year in the same light. Each time the liturgical year begins again at the outset of Advent, we are in a very different place than we were the year before, and the same spiritual things might hit us completely differently. Moreover, our hearts within and the world without have both changed in clear ways over the past year, and so a new year gives a chance to reflect on how we need to grow and where we need to go in the spiritual life. So the new year can bring with it new graces that can in turn lead to a whole new you.

Still what is the purpose of the whole liturgical calendar? With the flow from Advent to Christmas; then to a little bit of Ordinary Time; followed up by Lent, the Sacred Triduum, and Easter; and then finally the second part of Ordinary Time, the whole of the liturgical year is meant to shape us to become more and more like Christ. While celebrating the various feast and mysteries in Christ's life, we are meant to be conformed to the humility of His incarnation, the poverty of His birth, the charity of His crucifixion, the holiness of His resurrection, and so forth. Throughout all the mysteries and events in Christ's life, He won for us certain graces that shape and mold us to become like Him. The whole of the liturgical year, then, leads us on this path through the most important mysteries in Christ's in the major liturgical seasons as well as through the rest of His mysteries in Ordinary Time. In other words, the liturgical year is structured so that we can be conformed to Christ.

Maybe this year's Catholic New Year is a prime opportunity to make a Catholic New Year's Resolution? Instead of dieting, maybe the Lord is inviting you to fast and offer up the sacrifices for the holy souls in purgatory or for a sick family member. Instead of exercising more, maybe the Lord is inviting you to exercise your prayer muscles more by saying a daily Rosary or coming to adoration once a week. Instead of cutting out scrolling while in bed ... well, maybe the Lord is actually inviting you to do that and replace it with time spent in prayer before bed and after waking up. All in all, there are so many ways that we can examine the typical sort of New Year's Resolutions and Catholicize them so that our lives can bear great fruit in this upcoming year: New Year, New Graces, New You.

PS. In the different liturgical years, we also have different sets of readings at Mass. Here are a couple of tips on how to figure out which liturgical year we are in. Both of these hints connect with the calendar year in which most of the liturgical year occurs. So for instance, most of this liturgical year is in 2022 so that is how we will make the calculations.

For Daily Mass, there are Years I and II. Year I corresponds to odd numbered years, and Year II corresponds to even numbered years. Thus, 2022 is Year II.

For Sunday Mass, there are Years A (Matthew), B (Mark), and C (Luke). To calculate this, you take the year number and divide it by three. If it is divisible by three, then it is Year C. The quick way to figure out if a year is divisible by three is to add the sum of its numbers and see if that number is divisible by three. So 2022 = 2+0+2+2 = 6, which is divisible by three. So we are now in Year C and will be hearing from Luke's Gospel on most Sundays.
