MUSIC NOTES

Next week, for the Second Sunday of Lent, the Schola will sing music of Jacob Handl, born in the Duchy of Carniola in the Holy Roman Empire. In his mid-teens, he traveled through Austria, Bohemia, Moravia, and Silesia, singing for a time in the choir at the Benedictine Melk Abbey (still active) on the Danube in lower Austria. He later served as a musician in the Viennese court chapel, as choirmaster for a Moravian bishop, and as organist of the Church of St. John on the Balustrade in Prague from 1585 until his death in 1591.

On feastdays and in privileged seasons such as Lent and Eastertide, the Schola offers a choral Mass Ordinary at the

Solemn Mass.

LENTEN FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

According to the Current Discipline:

Laws of Days of Abstinence:

For all aged 14 and older, obligatory abstention from flesh meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays of Lent.

Laws of Days of Penance:

Applies to all the Faithful during the entirety of Lent and Fridays outside of Lent.

Laws of Days of Fast:

For all aged 18 to 59, inclusive, one full meal permitted and two other meals, which, when combined, are less than a full meal, on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Law of the Eucharistic Fast:

Complete fast from all food and drink (excluding water and medicine) for one hour before the reception of Holy Communion. This applies throughout the year.

LENTEN LITURGICAL OBSERVANCES

The penitential season of Lent (from the Old English meaning 'spring' and also known as *Quadragesima* in Latin, meaning 'fortieth') begins on Ash Wednesday.

In Lent, violet vestments are worn and the *Gloria* and *Alleluia* are omitted. According to the *General Instructions of the Roman Missal*, the document governing the celebration of the Ordinary Form of the Mass, the organ is to be used only "to give necessary support to the singing." Thus, as much as possible, the Mass is sung *a cappella*, the hymn accompaniments are subdued, and the organ voluntaries are omitted.

As the Church strips herself of festal trimming entering into the spiritual desert, her faithful are likewise called to a heightened order of penitence, fasting, abstinence, and almsgiving. Making a good confession, attending daily Mass, and praying the Office, Stations, and Rosary are all worthy resolutions.

THE FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

Grant, almighty God,
through the yearly observances of holy Lent,
that we may grow in understanding
of the riches hidden in Christ
and by worthy conduct pursue their effects.
Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,
who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, for ever and ever.

The collect (opening prayer) of the First Sunday of Lent possesses the pithy style of the Roman Liturgy. The very compact text invites overlooking unless you are willing to parse it with me, which might be a fine discipline for beginning the season.

First, prayer notes that Lent is a yearly observance. This states the obvious and so much more. The season not only recurs, but recurrence shapes the season. Part of this Lent lies in its difference from last Lent. Of course, prayer, fasting, and almsgiving constitute the perennial "observances" of this time. Receiving ashes, making a good confession, and walking the Stations of the Cross give ritual expression to these spiritual works. Lent does not change in itself, but it intersects with my changes; its timeless practices enable me to put in front of myself this year's call to growth. 2020 has brought things I must accept and things I must stop accepting. Recollection, self-denial, and generosity strengthen me against evading the conversion assigned to me now.

Experience tells me that in the fertile desert of these days God presents me with a call to change that is timely for my stage of life, for the work I am now doing, and for the circumstances in which I live. If I consent, God will administer Lent to me each year in such a way that, year by year, He brings me to the fullness of myself. To this outlook, I offer the corollary that if God lets me perceive a need for change then I am ready to make that change: He shows me what He has made me ready to deal with this year.

For instance, how do I perceive this year's Lent apart from the circumstance of the presidential election and the political climate that marks it? Naturally, part of this year's Forty Days of prayer will be for the country and the decision it faces. But a complete Lent 2020 will demand that I own how I am dealing with the tensions of this time. Am I letting its anxieties and angers shape me inwardly? The ancient works of those days remind me sternly that I have the inward resources for countering this. Jesus stands alone in the desert and faces down Satan, because with God he is not alone and not powerless. With God I too have a firm platform from which to contemplate the struggle before me on the political stage. I can observe the pain beneath the shouting there, and love the shouters who are afraid of the dark.

If I embrace this potential, perhaps I will discover those "riches hidden in Christ." This Lent, taking a fresh look at myself, I will thrive in symbiosis with a fresh look at Christ. Observing him will become more effective if I practice personal honesty: gazing upon him will make personal honesty vastly more fruitful. In these weeks I will see him confound the Devil with his absolute reliance on the Father. Succeeding Sundays will show me Christ transfigured on the mountain, quenching the thirst of the Samaritan Woman, opening the eyes of the Man Born Blind, and bring his friend Lazarus back from the dead. On Palm Sunday he receives the adulation of the crowd who will demand his death on Good Friday. In between he will wash Peter's feet and give us all the mystery of the Eucharist.

Taken together, what does all this reveal? As I gaze on Christ going through his Lenten motions I realize that he is gazing upon me with that love which is complete challenge and complete mercy at the same time. He looks at me from his place of inner freedom and invites me to share it with him. His is a humanity not hobbled by suspicion or resentment, prejudice or avarice. He summons me to join him as he receives freely and gives freely in communion with God and neighbor. Even as the circle of death closes in on him in his hour his soul remains open to the exchange of love. The Samaritan Woman (John 4), the Man Born Blind (John 9), and Lazarus (John 11) each return the gaze of Christ and begin to see their world though his eyes.

The eyes of Christ see the victory of God in every circumstance; my sin and regret, our mutual suspicion and misunderstanding, and this moment's seemingly intractable conflicts. If by "right conduct" I am to pursue the "effects" of the riches hidden in Christ, this will mean opening myself to his gaze so that I look with him on the pain of my world. He will strengthen me by the works of my Lent to look clearly at the election of 2020, at the spread of the Coronavirus, burgeoning homelessness, and rising waters. He will call me to see these things with love for those who suffer and with hope in the promise of Easter.
