MUSIC NOTES

Next week, for the Fourth Sunday of Lent, the Schola will sing music for upper voices (sopranos and altos) by the German Romantic era titans Johannes Brahms, remembered primarily for his four Symphonies, and the more liturgically-focused Josef Rheinberger.

Tomás Luis de Victoria, known as the 'Spanish Palestrina,' was born in Ávila but in 1565 went to Rome to become cantor at the Collegium Germanicum. Ordained a priest in 1575, he received a chaplaincy at S. Girolamo della Carità until King Philip II appointed Victoria chaplain to his sister, the Dowager Empress María in 1587. The Schola will one of his polyphonic Marian antiphons and a Mass Ordinary modeled after it for the Annunciation.

The New York City Chapter of the American Guild of Organists will present an organ recital of improvised meditations on the Stations of the Cross on Wednesday, March 18 at 7 PM at the Church of Saint Ignatius Loyola (Park Avenue at 84th Street). Renowned for their improvisational skill, David Enlow, the immediate past Dean of the NYC Chapter, and Dr. Kalle Toivio, the 2018 winner of the National Competition in Organ Improvisation, share the bench in a sequence of vignettes on the *Via Crucis*. Saint Ignatius Loyola is home to a landmark four-manual, 91-rank organ built by the English N.P. Mander firm.

LAETARE SUNDAY

Next Sunday, the Church will celebrate 'Laetare' Sunday. This Latin title is taken from the incipit (first phrase) of the Introit of the Mass: 'Laetare Jerusalem, et conventum facite omnes qui diligitis eam.' (Rejoice, O Jerusalem, and come together all you who love her.) quoting Isaiah 66:10. The analogous Sunday in Advent is the Third Sunday, called 'Gaudete.'

Pope Innocent III in 1216 expounded on it in a sermon: "On this Sunday, which marks the middle of Lent, a measure of consoling relaxation is provided, so that the faithful may not break down under the severe strain of Lenten fast but may continue to bear the restrictions with a refreshed and easier heart."

As a reprieve from the penitential violet, the traditional liturgical color for Laetare Sunday is rose. (*No, it is not pink.*) Furthermore, the use of the organ and moderate floral decorations are permitted.

SCRUTINIES

If you regularly attend the Solemn Mass at Noon on Sundays you may remember that during Lent you encounter the three great gospels of the Samaritan woman (John 4), of the man born blind (John 9), and of Lazarus (John 11). Upon the proclamation of these gospels on the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent follows extensive prayer over those to be baptized. These events carry the name "scrutiny" because this invite is not as one of study or observation but as prayer. He seeks for our new Brothers and Sisters the loving and challenging work of the Holy Spirit, who, "scrutinizes everything, even the depths of God." 1 Cor. 2: 10-11.

Now this year (Year A), we read these gospels at every Mass and so each of us can pray for the catechumens as God's Spirit actively tends their souls, but we can also invite the Spirit's scrutiny into our own hearts and minds. His revelations to us may cause pain, but they bring healing and encouragement. I believe we will proceed more serenely and charitably in challenging times if we keep our own conversion at center stage.

The gospels of the scrutinies enable us to do this because they present Christ accompanying a person, or persons, through a protracted experience. Often we see Jesus extend a healing and then move on. In these passages he leads the Samaritan woman, the man born blind, along with Mary, Martha and Lazarus, by stages into the depths of faith. In the course of these many verses the Lord liberates their hearts from the constriction of fear and shame, prejudice and self-righteousness. In effect, each of these Gospels is a scrutiny.

Reflect on how Christ has accompanied us through the stages of our Christian life, bothering us with the truth about ourselves, the weakness and the potential. I would like to focus on the prayer of scrutiny for this and the next two Sundays. As a foundation for this please read the following paragraphs from the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults.

- 141. The scrutinies, which are solemnly celebrated on Sundays and are reinforced by an exorcism, are rites for self-searching and repentance and have above all a spiritual purpose. The scrutinies are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. For the scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth, and the life. These rites, therefore, should complete the conversion of the elect and deepen their resolve to hold fast to Christ and to carry out their decision to love God above all.
- 142. Because they are asking for the three sacraments of initiation, the elect must have the intention of achieving an intimate knowledge of Christ and his Church, and they are expected particularly to progress in genuine self-knowledge through serious examination of their lives and true repentance.
- 143. In order to inspire in the elects a desire for purification and redemption by Christ, three scrutinies are celebrated. By this means, firs of all, the elect are instructed gradually about the mystery of sin, from which the whole world and every person longs to be delivered and thus saved from its present and future consequences. Second, their spirit is filled with Christ the Redeemer, who is the living water (Gospel of the Samaritan woman in the first scrutiny), the light of the world (gospel of the man born blind in the second scrutiny), the resurrection and the life (gospel of Lazarus in the third scrutiny). From the first to the final scrutiny the elect should progress in their perception of sin and their desire for salvation.
- 144. In the rite of exorcism, which is celebrated by a priest or deacon, the elect, who have already learned from the church their mother the mystery of deliverance from sin by Christ, are freed from the effects of sin and from the influence of the devil. They receive new strength in the midst of their spiritual journey and they open their hearts to receive the gifts for the Savior.
- 145. The priest or deacon who is the presiding celebrant should carry out the celebration in such a way that the faithful in the assembly will also derive benefit from the liturgy of the scrutinies and join in the intercessions for the elect.

Perhaps each of us can now place ourselves in the place of the catechumens for the prayer of exorcism, to be said over them this Sunday.

God of power, you sent your Son to be our Savior. Grant that these catechumens, who, like the woman of Samaria, thirst for living water, may turn to the Lord as they hear his word and acknowledge the sins and weaknesses that weigh them down. Protect them from vain relatable on self, and defend them from the power of Satan. Free them from the spirit of deceit, so that, admitting the wrong they have done, they may attain purity of heart and advance on the way to salvation.

The Celebrant then lays hands on each of the elect and then prays with hands outstretched over them

Lord Jesus, you are the fountain for which they thirst, you are the Master whom they seek. In your presence they dare not claim to be without sin, for you alone are the Holy One of God. They open their hearts to you in faith, they confess their faults and lay bare their hidden wounds. In your love, free them from their infirmities, heal their sickness, quench their thirst, and give them peace. In the power of your name, which we call upon in faith, stand by them now and heal them. Rule over that spirit of evil, conquered by your rising from the dead. Show your elect the way of salvation in the Holy Spirit, that they may come to worship the Father in truth, for your live and reign for ever and ever.

May the challenges of this Lent bring us growth in the Lord. Fr. Walter

LENTEN FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

According to the Current Discipline:

Laws of Days of Abstinence:

For all aged 14 and older, obligatory abstention from flesh meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays of Lent.

Laws of Days of Penance:

Applies to all the Faithful during the entirety of Lent and Fridays outside of Lent.

Laws of Days of Fast:

For all aged 18 to 59, inclusive, one full meal permitted and two other meals, which, when combined, are less than a full meal, on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Law of the Eucharistic Fast:

Complete fast from all food and drink (excluding water and medicine) for one hour before the reception of Holy Communion. This applies throughout the year.

LENTEN LITURGICAL OBSERVANCES

The penitential season of Lent (from the Old English meaning 'spring' and also known as *Quadragesima* in Latin, meaning 'fortieth') begins on Ash Wednesday.

In Lent, violet vestments are worn and the *Gloria* and *Alleluia* are omitted. According to the *General Instructions of the Roman Missal*, the document governing the celebration of the Ordinary Form of the Mass, the organ is to be used only "to give necessary support to the singing." Thus, as much as possible, the Mass is sung *a cappella*, the hymn accompaniments are subdued, and the organ voluntaries are omitted.

As the Church strips herself of festal trimming entering into the spiritual desert, her faithful are likewise called to a heightened order of penitence, fasting, abstinence, and almsgiving. Making a good confession, attending daily Mass, and praying the Office, Stations, and Rosary are all worthy resolutions.
