# **P**ASSIONTIDE

The season of Lent ends with Passiontide, from the Fifth Sunday of Lent, known as "Passion Sunday" until the Triduum. The *Judica me* (the psalm traditionally recited by the celebrant as part of his 'Prayers at the Foot of the Altar') and the *Gloria Patri* are suppressed because they evoke sentiments of joy. The liturgy during this time focuses on and commemorates the sorrowful events of the last week of Jesus' mortal life.

During this fortnight of "deep Lent," violet veils traditionally cover crosses (until the end of the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday) and cover images and statues until the *Gloria* of the Easter Vigil. The veiling was associated with the Gospel (John 8:46-59) formerly read on Lent V, in which Jesus "hid himself" from the people (*Jesus autem abscondebat se*). Statues and images of the saints are likewise covered because, as theologian Nikolaus Nilles explained, "It would seem improper for the servants to appear when the Master himself is hidden." Since the revision of the Roman Calendar in 1969, the name Passiontide is no longer formally used, although the Preface called "Passion of the Lord I (The Power of the Cross)" is used in the fifth week of Lent.

#### HOLY WEEK MUSIC

The musical repertoire suited for Holy Week includes an overwhelming number of masterpieces from every generation. Foremost in the light of public recognition are the Passions of J.S. Bach, the settings of the *Stabat Mater* of Dvořák and Rossini, and *The Last Seven Words* of Dubois and Haydn. However, it is in the smaller-scaled Renaissance compositions for Holy Week – those intended to be sung within the context of a liturgy – where the greatest musical riches can be heard.

From Palm Sunday through Easter Sunday, the Parish will offer 17 services with music, including 8 with the Schola Cantorum. All told: 21 motets, 4 choral Mass Ordinaries, 2 chanted Passions, 1 Magnificat, and 1 setting of the Lamentations, as well as dozens of chanted antiphons, responses, and orations. Not a single piece of choral repertoire will be repeated, as is the case for the entire year. This is all the more impressive when you consider that the only time the Schola rehearses is for a 75 minute session immediately preceding each choral service.

#### LENTEN FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

According to the Current Discipline:

#### Laws of Days of Abstinence:

For all aged 14 and older, obligatory abstention from flesh meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays of Lent.

Laws of Days of Penance:

Applies to all the Faithful during the entirety of Lent and Fridays outside of Lent.

# Laws of Days of Fast:

For all aged 18 to 59, inclusive, one full meal permitted and two other meals, which, when combined, are less than a full meal, on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

#### Law of the Eucharistic Fast:

Complete fast from all food and drink (excluding water and medicine) for one hour before the reception of Holy Communion. This applies throughout the year.

# CLOSED DOORS

A way to get ready for the extraordinary Holy Week of 2021 is to look for the closed doors in our two churches. Three of our shrines, the Altar of the Holy Souls at St. Catherine's and at St. Vincent's, the Altar of the Sacred Heart and the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe are made as triptychs. They consist of a central panel flanked by leaves on hinges, and during Passiontide we close them. Fr. Allen will have at the same time, veiled statuary at St. Catherine's in yards of purple cloth. During this most intense time of Lent we are fasting from images. (We would need acres of fabric to veil the images at St. Vincent's.)

In the days when we most expect people to visit church, why are we hiding the contents? To take the point further, where images are veiled we are most concerned to cover the image of the Cross, and this, during the season of its greatest prominence. Consider then, the paradox of abstaining from images at a time when they would seem most helpful.

At one level the practice takes self-denial deeper. The images of the saints delight us with their beauty; they offer diversion to people who are bored by the homily, and they provide consolation to those tired of the harsh realities outside. Hence, veiling them takes the icing off the cake of coming to church. Here the principle of fasting is taken to the next level, where we recognize that even the things of religion can divert us, via the senses, from religion's depths.

Passiontide rivets us on the core of the faith with a focus on the events of the Lord's complete self-giving in the Upper Room and on the Cross. Of course abstinence does not condemn: fasting gives up good things to reach better things. I give up delightful offerings of this world so as to focus desire on the gifts of eternity. When God thereby becomes the actual organizing principle of my life, then I use well nature's bounty and the works of the human hand. If I take this process seriously, I end up with a truly temperate life in which I can savor the pleasures of human living healthfully, humbly, and gratefully.

But the veiling of images speaks too, of their inadequacy. Certainly our parish possesses highly artistic renderings of the saints and the events of salvation. They exude aesthetic reverence and provide truly helpful service to prayer. But in the end, they must also fail to capture the fullness of faith's mysteries. The Lord's Crucifixion and the Last Supper do not consent to remain on the canvas or within the wood and marble, just as they resist consignment to history. We call them mysteries because they happened at a moment in time, but they continue to have impact now. They have passed inside of us to shape us.

The Lord's Passion offers consolation and healing now, and it makes for a present pattern of life organized around self-giving. The Last Supper promised the supper at Emmaus, heralding a repast that has never ended.

The Eucharist of Jesus offers the image of a life truly shared, but also the means by which we truly share life in charity. People of faith come to the Mass of the Lord's Supper not only to remember the event in the Upper Room, but also to recognize anew the Cenacle intimacy they have with the Lord all the time, through Holy Communion.

Artists image the victory of the Lord's Resurrection in all kinds of ways, but it lies within us as a promise enticing and propelling us forward in the Gospel life.

In these days the words of Scripture, paired with unadorned ritual, wake us up to what lies with us as guidance and consolation for now and as hope for the future. In a time of great change we realize that we are rooted in our Risen Lord. Where images can be covered, the first unveiling is the Good Friday Showing of His Cross, the image which makes sense of all the others.
