The Legacy of St. Thomas in the Academy

A WHOLISTIC VIEW

Recently, a Dominican who teaches at the Angelicum (the Dominican school in Rome) was visiting New York City, and he shared with the friars here about the different types of education that students receive in various schools in Rome. Many of the major religious orders have their own schools, and these often specialize in different things. For instance, the Teresianum run by the Carmelites excels in courses about spiritual theology, and the Anselmianum run by the Benedictines has amazing courses on the liturgy. In many ways, there are two schools, though, that seem to be remarkable in teaching the whole of theology. These would be the Angelicum and the Gregorianum, which is run by the Jesuits.

Comparing the schools, there are two different types of education that people receive. The Gregorianum has world class experts teaching a variety of topics who have rich insights into their particular fields and are often well-renowned pedagogues. Yet at the same time, there isn't an interrelationship between the classes; there isn't something that binds the whole of the education together as a sort of united intellectual formation where all the classes intimately fit together. The Angelicum is different though. There, all the classes are taught by professors who were formed by the thought of Aquinas. Hence, there is a hermeneutic of unity in the coursework, and all the classes are parts of a larger whole.

This is not a slight against the Jesuits as there is a historical reason for this. At the time the Dominicans were founded, there weren't experts in Scripture or moral theology or doctrinal theology. The professors were expected to teach all the above. They were to be masters of the whole of theology. On the other hand, around the time that the Jesuits were founded, the Church was responding to the Protestant reformers; establishing seminaries; and wrestling with a slew of questions about the interpretation of Scripture, the history and understanding of dogma, and the core teachings of the moral life. Hence, when the Jesuits were being formed, the Church was transitioning to a world of specialization. From these two time periods come the Dominicans' unified view and the Jesuits' particularized view.

A WHOLISTIC FORMATION

I think that these historical musings reveal something of St. Thomas's legacy for academia. He was one of these all-around masters,

and his Summa Theologiae was designed to relate to all the areas of theology. In many ways, the Dominicans have even continued this approach into our contemporary times. Examples such as the Angelicum and the Dominican House of Studies in Washington reveal that there is a clearly unified approach to the search for truth, where all the academic areas fit together into a beautiful whole. Every part reveals an aspect of truth that forms a whole canvas revealing God Himself. In other words, the Dominican approach to education is not only built on the search for truth and wisdom in all fields of study, but it is also shaped in such a way that all the parts should work together to reveal the whole. They should function like a symphony where each of the classrooms plays their part in the harmonious sounding of truth.

When this is accomplished, the results are beautiful. On the one hand, the mind is shaped to search for truth in all things. On the other hand, the mind is also shaped in such a way that everything can be seen as united and related to one another or as diverging from that. In turn, this should lead to a wholistic formation of the mind and heart, not just one or the other, because Scripture, dogma, and the Church's moral teachings will all be seen to interpenetrate, be supported by, and be dependent upon one another.

That is a profound gift to the Church.

LENTEN FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

According to the Current Discipline:

Laws of Days of Abstinence:

For all aged 14 and older, obligatory abstention from flesh meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays of Lent.

Laws of Days of Penance:

Applies to all the Faithful during the entirety of Lent and Fridays outside of Lent.

Laws of Days of Fast:

For all aged 18 to 59, inclusive, one full meal permitted and two other meals, which, when combined, are less than a full meal, on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Dominican Rite Mass for the 750th
Anniversary of the Death of St. Thomas
Aquinas

On Thursday, March 7 at 7 PM at St. Vincent's, we will celebrate the 750th Anniversary of the Death of St. Thomas Aquinas with a Solemn Dominican Rite Mass

Because of the Double Jubilee of the 700th Anniversary of his Canonization last summer and the 750th Anniversary of his Death on this day, the Dominican Order has been granted an indult by the Vatican so that everyone who comes to a Mass in St. Thomas's memory and that is offered at a Dominican church can receive a plenary indulgence (under the normal conditions).

This is a beautiful way to celebrate this once in a lifetime moment, and it can be a beautiful complement to the Lenten Parish Study and the Lenten Holy Hour Preaching that are happening right now too.

The Parish will offer the Forty Hours
Devotion, beginning with Solemn Exposition
after the 12:10 PM Mass on Friday, March
8. During this time, we will have various
other devotions like a Children's Holy
Half Hour, the Frassati Fellowship month
Holy Hour, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy,
preaching, and more. A more complete
schedule will come soon.

On Sunday, March 10 at 4 PM, the Schola will offer 30 minutes of choral music featuring Eucharistic texts of St. Thomas Aquinas, O.P. set to music from across the centuries. Immediately following, at 4:30 PM, Forty Hours will conclude with a Solemn Eucharistic Procession and Benediction.

The practice of offering an extended period of Eucharistic Adoration lasting forty hours dates back at least to the 1520s. It was introduced in the U.S. by St. John Neumann in Philadelphia and quickly spread around the country. 40 is a holy number which occurs throughout salvation history: Noah's days in the ark, the Israelites' years in the desert, the days between Jesus's Nativity and Presentation (Christmastide), His days of fasting in the desert (Lent), and the days between His Resurrection and Ascension (Eastertide).

Most settings of the Ordinary are named after the chant, madrigal, or motet from which the Mass takes its musical thematic material. For example, Lasso's Missa Locutus sum, which the Schola sang last Sunday, is based on Lasso's own Lenten motet Locutus sum. Some Masses, often English ones, however, have titles describing their construction. Byrd's Mass for Four Voices, which the Schola sang on Ash Wednesday, is comprised of four parts (SATB). The term "Mean" refers to a voice part having roughly the same range as an alto or mezzo-soprano.
