#### “LORD, GIVE ME THIS WATER”

#### WHAT IT MEANS TO BE A BAPTIZED CHRISTIAN

The Sunday Readings in Lent this year are meant to teach us about the meaning of Baptism. We will take the opportunity to reflect on why the Church of old has seen three passages from John’s Gospel — the Samaritan woman, the healing of the man born blind, and the raising of Lazarus — to be about Christian initiation. These, as well as the other Lenten Gospels, reveal to us the implications of baptism in our private, ecclesial, and social lives.

### MUSIC NOTES

Next Sunday, for the Third Sunday of Lent, the Schola will sing motets of two 20th century composers. Pablo Casals was born in El Vendrell, a town in the Catalonia territory of northeastern Spain. His father was the local parish organist and Pablo’s first teacher. After studying at the Madrid Royal Conservatory, Casals went on to become one of the most famous cellists of all time as well as a noted composer. He was awarded the U.S. Presidential Medal of Freedom by John F. Kennedy in 1963. Alberto Ginastera was born, studied, and taught in Buenos Aires. His *Lamentations of Jeremiah*, Op. 14, of which next week’s motet is the second movement, was written in 1946.

# EUCCHARISTIC REVIVAL

## *History of Active Participation, Part VI*



While I would like to treat together the various writings on active participation from Pope St. Paul VI, which actually began even during the Second Vatican Council, there are two related documents to discuss first.

Right before Pope Ven. Pius XII died, he approved an Instruction called *De Musica Sacra* (1958). This document follows the tradition of having a distinction between sung Masses [both Solemn Masses and Sung (or High) Masses fit into this category] and read (or Low) Masses. Furthermore, within each of these types of Masses, different parts of the Mass are prioritized for what should be sung and when.

After Vatican II, a post-Conciliar Consilium (yes, that is a tongue twister) was set up and tasked with implementing the teachings of *Sacrosanctum Concilium*. In their document *Musicam Sacram* (1967), they reaffirm *De Musica Sacra's* multitier approach to what is sung and when (*Musicam Sacram*, 28-36). Furthermore, *Musicam Sacram* grounds this in both the interior and exterior forms of participation we have been examining (*Musicam Sacram*, 15). Here, they once again point out that the exterior participation should reveal the deeper interior participation (*Musicam Sacram*, 15b). The document even goes so far as to say, “The faithful should also be taught to unite themselves interiorly to what the ministers or choir sing, so that by listening to them they may raise their minds to God” (*Musicam Sacram*, 15).

Okay, but why is this important? All of this helps us to see that whether or not we are

exteriorly saying or doing something during the Mass, all those present are called to participate in their own appropriate way. The priest, the people, the choir, the servers, the lectors—all of them have their functions to pray. Sometimes these overlap, such as when everyone says together, “Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed” or when everyone observes a communal silence right before the opening Collect. At other times when the choir is singing or when a lector is proclaiming a reading, the rest of the congregation is invited into a contemplative interior participation.

Moreover, this is also important because it is an invitation to enter into the same part of the Mass in different ways on different days. For instance, when we recite the Entrance Antiphon at a Low Mass or hear the choir sing it at a Solemn Mass, in both of those instances, we can actively participate, albeit in different ways.

Since the time I arrived a year and a half ago, I have found the Parish’s custom of this threefold structure of Solemn, Sung, and Low Masses, to be a beautiful way to enter into these different types of Masses and pray along with you all as we are drawn deeper into communion with the Lord. As we come closer to the liturgies of Holy Week, may our interior and exterior participation bear great fruit in our souls and lead us safely on the path to heaven.



# LENT

## *Lenten Fasting and Abstinence*

### **Days of Abstinence:**

Ash Wednesday, all Fridays in Lent, and Good Friday for all who have reached their 14th birthday, no meat can be taken.

### **Days of Fast:**

For all aged 18 to 59, inclusive, one full meatless meal permitted and two other meals, which, when combined, are less than a full meatless meal, on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

### **Easter Duty Obligation:**

The Easter Duty to go to Confession and receive Holy Communion must be made from the First Sunday in Lent (February 26) through Trinity Sunday (June 4th).

### **Self Denial:**

Is encouraged on a voluntary basis. Acts may include daily Mass, spiritual study, Lenten devotions, the Rosary, Stations of the Cross, and deeds of mercy and kindness

## *RCIA and the Lenten Scrutinies*

During Lent, the Church prays for and prepares to welcome new members through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults.

A “Catechumen” (meaning one being instructed) is someone who is preparing for baptism. At the Easter Vigil, a Catechumen receives all three Sacraments of Christian Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist.

A “Candidate” is someone who has been baptized, but not as a Catholic. At the Easter Vigil, a Candidate makes a profession of faith, is confirmed, and receives the Eucharist.

After a period of catechesis, the Catechumens participate in the Rite of Election on the First Sunday of Lent at St. Patrick’s Cathedral, and the Candidates participate in the Rite of Continuing Conversion on the Second Sunday of Lent. In these Rites, the Church formally ratifies the Catechumens’ readiness for the Sacraments of Initiation and the Candidates’ readiness to be received into full communion with the Catholic Church. In turn, the Catechumens – thereafter known as the “Elect” – publicly acknowledge their desire to receive said Sacraments, and the Candidates their desire to be enter full communion.

At the 12 NOON Mass on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent, the Elect undergo the First, Second, and Third Scrutinies. These Rites of examination and repentance are to deliver the Elect from the power of sin and temptation and to give them strength in Christ. For these Masses, a special set of orations are used by the Celebrant, specific intercessions are offered on behalf of the Elect, and the Year A lectionary is always read: the Gospels of the Samaritan woman (John 4:5-42); the healing of the man born blind (John 9:1-41); and the resurrection of Lazarus (John 11:1-45).
