MUSIC NOTES

Next week, for the Third Sunday of Lent, the Schola will sing music of the Iberian Renaissance. Francisco López Capillas was born in Mexico City of Spanish parentage. Ordained a priest, he was named Juan Gutiérrez de Padilla's assistant for the Puebla Cathedral in 1641. In 1648, he became assistant at the Cathedral of Mexico City and then *maestro* in 1654, remaining until his death.

Manuel Cardoso represents the 'golden age' of Portuguese polyphony. Born in Fronteira, near Portalegre, Cardoso sang as a chorister at Évora Cathedral and joined the Carmelite order in 1588. For most of his career he was the organist at the Carmelite Convento do Carmo in Lisbon.

Francisco Guerrero received musical training from fellow Sevillan Cristóbal de Morales. His precocious skill led to the appointment at age 17 as *maestro di capilla* of the Cathedral of Jaén. He returned to Seville in 1549 where until his death he served its Cathedral as *maestro*. A devout priest, Guerrero made a holy pilgrimage to Rome, Venice, and the Holy Land in 1588 and published a popular book about his adventure.

On feastdays and in privileged seasons such as Lent and Eastertide, the Schola offers a choral Mass Ordinary

at the Solemn Mass.

STEWARDS OF SOULS

I hope your Lent has begun well. Prayer makes up a substantial part of the season's observance; let me invite you to lend your spiritual energy to an important work of intercession. Each year, as winter yields to spring, our Shrine of St. Jude celebrates a novena of prayer beginning on March 11 that leads up to the Solemnity of St. Joseph on March 19. As we have done for several years now, we will seek his prayers for our loved ones who no longer practice their faith. We hope you will join your personal intentions to this common one.

We honor St. Joseph as husband of Mary and as Patron of the Universal Church. Appointed to pray for the whole Church, Joseph surely will not neglect those of her members who are far from her life. Ever since he became the most intimate companion of Jesus and Mary, Joseph has kept safe God's beloved. He loved as his own those who were not his own and so demonstrated a way of loving open to us by our baptism. St. Joseph shows us the charity of the steward, and the practice of stewarding souls will lead us to the happiness of charity.

God draws that love out of us by showing us people to care for. Having recognized the neighbor in our path, we tend to him or her in practical ways and in the ways of human kindness and concern. But part of neighborly care will mean presenting the faith. With our children, our students, and our parishioners we seek to share our faith as well as we might. In fact, giving an account of our belief in Christ Jesus deepens that very gift in our own hearts and minds. We count it a precious blessing when those we have loved in this way make the faith their own, so that its practice becomes their happiness.

Yet sometimes our lavish outlay of care seems to go no where. Even years of loving exposure to church life do not connect people to the Faith in such a way that it becomes their deepest habit of life. Thousands upon thousands of people were "raised Catholic" and never got beyond the surface of Catholicism. Nowadays scandal has given new reasons not to believe or not to practice. How do we respond to those who have lapsed for whatever reason? Are we indignant? Or wrathful? Do we dismiss or threaten? Are we weighed down by guilt, "What did I do wrong?"

An alternative to these dead ends is to let pain and disappointment open up a deeper way of loving. Such a love will demand two things. First, it will mean showing people how much joy we have in the practice of our faith. Second it will demand that we actively entrust them to God's love. If we accept this, then prayer for those who are alienated becomes part of our own living of the Gospel. As we pray in this way, we grow in faith ourselves, for we recognize that in the end it is God who gives belief. Accepting this, we can become serene in our own working of presenting the belief we have received.

As a parish community we will say the prayer of the novena at every weekday and Sunday Mass during the novena. Holy cards for the novena will be available in each church at the altar of St. Joseph. Along with them you will find petition slips, should you wish to add your personal intention to our common one.

The Shrine of St. Jude provides these materials as part of its mission. It also seeks to unite in common prayer all who participate in our Dominican life and apostolate throughout this neighborhood. It gives me joy to ponder clergy, religious, and laity of all generations longing together for the strengthening of the body of Christ, and the healing of all the wounds that keep people apart from it. Such a great shared endeavor would make us all an eloquent Holy Preaching.

Dear friends in the Lord:

On Sunday, March 15, in all of our parishes and in churches throughout the country, we will be collecting your offering for the *Catholic Relief Services*. When you support this, you actually serve Jesus in disguise in some of the most marginalized communities in our world. Your participation makes a difference for so many around the globe.

In remote villages of Ethiopia, girls do not always enjoy the opportunity to receive an education. They often are expected to care for family members, and many are encouraged to marry early, at ages as young as 12. For Zeineba, a seventh-grade girl in one rural village, education continues to help her grow and build future opportunities. Her academic scores have improved, she has more confidence, and she leads a group of students that provides support for other girls. Through the support of Catholic Relief Services and partnerships between the Church and local communities, girls like Zeineba are able to stay in school. They receive tutoring and school fee assistance to help them to reach their full potential. Even girls who have left school are helped through training programs that give them opportunities to invest in their own small businesses. Unlike her mother, who never went to school, and her older sisters, who married before completing their education, Zeineba continues her studies with the hope of someday becoming a doctor. She not only has a bright future but sets an example for neighbors and for her two younger sisters. "I'm teaching my sisters to follow in my footsteps," she says.

Through funds from the collection, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' program for the pastoral care of migrants, refugees, and travelers collaborates with local dioceses to visit and attend to the needs of underserved migrant farm workers and others who live on the margins. - Today at our 12 NOON Solemn Mass we will celebrate the Rite of Continuing Conversion. This prayer
 encourages the Christian men and women who feel that the Holy Spirit is leading them in to the life of the
 Catholic Church.
- On this Sunday we also recognize our Transfigured Lord as the fulfillment of the Law and the prophets. It will be appropriate then to pray for the Jewish people who also live by these two lights of Revelation.

• Of you my heart has spoken, seek his face. It is your face, O Lord, that I seek; hide not your face from me. Ps. 26:8-9

March 9

• Redeem me, O Lord, and have mercy on me. My foot stands on level ground; I will bless the Lord in the assembly. Ps. 25:11-12

• Give light to my eyes lest I fall asleep in death, lest my enemy say: I have overcome him. Ps. 12:4-5

LENTEN FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

According to the Current Discipline:

Laws of Days of Abstinence:

For all aged 14 and older, obligatory abstention from flesh meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays of Lent.

Laws of Days of Penance:

Applies to all the Faithful during the entirety of Lent and Fridays outside of Lent.

Laws of Days of Fast:

For all aged 18 to 59, inclusive, one full meal permitted and two other meals, which, when combined, are less than a full meal, on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Law of the Eucharistic Fast:

Complete fast from all food and drink (excluding water and medicine) for one hour before the reception of Holy Communion. This applies throughout the year.

LENTEN LITURGICAL OBSERVANCES

The penitential season of Lent (from the Old English meaning 'spring' and also known as *Quadragesima* in Latin, meaning 'fortieth') begins on Ash Wednesday.

In Lent, violet vestments are worn and the *Gloria* and *Alleluia* are omitted. According to the *General Instructions of the Roman Missal*, the document governing the celebration of the Ordinary Form of the Mass, the organ is to be used only "to give necessary support to the singing." Thus, as much as possible, the Mass is sung *a cappella*, the hymn accompaniments are subdued, and the organ voluntaries are omitted.

As the Church strips herself of festal trimming entering into the spiritual desert, her faithful are likewise called to a heightened order of penitence, fasting, abstinence, and almsgiving. Making a good confession, attending daily Mass, and praying the Office, Stations, and Rosary are all worthy resolutions.
