April 2, 2023 – Palm Sunday

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. On this day the Church recalls the entrance of Christ the Lord into Jerusalem to accomplish his Paschal Mystery. This is liturgically observed with a procession, blessing of palms, and proclamation of the Gospel passage recounting Christ's entrance. The Gospel of the Mass itself is the Passion according to Matthew. The liturgical color is now red throughout.

In our parish, *Blessing of Palms will take place at 11:30 AM at St. Catherine* of Siena followed by a procession through the streets, accompanied by a brass quartet, to St. Vincent Ferrer for the 12 Noon Solemn Mass.

HOLY WEEK FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

Day of Abstinence:

Good Friday is a day of abstinence for all who have reached their 14th birthday, no meat can be taken.

Day of Fast:

For all aged 18 to 59, inclusive, one full meatless meal permitted and two other meals, which, when combined, are less than a full meatless meal, on Good Friday.

Easter Duty Obligation:

The Easter Duty to go to Confession and receive Holy Communion must be made from the First Sunday in Lent (February 26) through Trinity Sunday (June 4th).

Self Denial:

Is encouraged on a voluntary basis. Acts may include daily Mass, spiritual study, Lenten devotions, the Rosary, Stations of the Cross, and deeds of mercy and kindness.

ALMSGIVING SUNDAY

This weekend, the Parish's monthly second collection will be taken-up for **H.E.L.P.** (Heating, Electricity, Lighting, and Property Management).

A PARISH FRAGRANT AND PLEASING TO THE LORD

During Holy Week, there is an oft forgotten Mass—the Chrism Mass—at which the bishop consecrates the holy oils that will be used throughout the year. (Here, in the Archdiocese of New York, the Chrism Mass takes place on Tuesday of Holy Week at 4 PM at the Cathedral.) The Oil of the Catechumens for those preparing for baptism; the Oil of the Infirm for Anointing of the Sick and Last Rites; and the Sacred Chrism for baptisms, confirmations, and ordinations are all consecrated at this Mass. At the end that Mass, there is a beautiful Prayer after Communion:

We beseech you, almighty God, that those you renew by your Sacraments may merit to become the pleasing fragrance of Christ. Who lives and reigns for ever and ever.

While we might be inclined to think just of those who will receive these oils, how as a Parish can we enter more deeply into this? In a sense, this is not just an invitation for those receiving these oils throughout the year. Rather, we are called to become "the pleasing fragrance of Christ." Yet, how do we do that?

This all starts with a life of prayer and is then carried out in good works. Having a life of deep prayer and frequent reception of the sacraments is at the heart of being Christ's pleasing fragrance in the world. For when our minds and hearts are more and more conformed to His Truth and Love, the more others will see Him in us. The more we become united to Christ, the more that we will offer ourselves to the Father like He did. Through the corporal and spiritual works of mercy, we can become Christ's instruments to help bring about the salvation of the world.


Imagine what it would be like if our whole Parish were one pleasing fragrance of Christ. How beautiful would it be if as a Parish we drew others to Christ by our fragrant way of life: a life of prayer and sacraments, a life of service, a life of truth and charity. How blessed would this be not only for us but also for all those who come to be with us!

There are three very practical ways that we can see this play out. First, on the night of Holy Saturday, we will celebrate the Easter Vigil and welcome new brothers and sisters into the Church as well as adult Catholics who will be confirmed. In charity, let us welcome them with our friendship and be sure to pray for them throughout the week and throughout their first year as Catholics. Our support, assistance, and love for them can help them to become a fragrance pleasing to the Lord. This year, we will have a time for fellowship after the Easter Vigil, which will be a wonderful time to do just this.

Second, there is service to the Parish, which can be manifest in many ways. From assisting as lectors, servers, ushers, and money counters; to volunteering for the Parish Coffee Hour on Sundays; to providing expertise to help with

particular projects throughout the year; and to many other things, there are numerous ways to support the Parish through offering the gift of your time and talents. If you are looking for ways to serve, we can use more volunteers for the Sunday Parish Coffee Hour as well as additional ushers for Sunday Masses. I would also like to compile a list of volunteers to help arrange for fellowship on certain feast days such as Candlemas, St. Joseph's Day, St. Dominic's Day, Our Lady of the Rosary, St. Cecilia's Day, and other special occasions like Easter Vigil and the end of the 125th Anniversary Year of St. Catherine's this August. If you would be willing to volunteer to help on these days, please contact Ginny in the Parish Office.

Finally, there is almsgiving and the financial support for our Parish, which benefits not only community but also all those visitors who join us for prayer and the sacraments. As you might have noticed in the last few months, we were blessed to create a new atrium for the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd at St. Vincent's, to be able to veil the statues at St. Vincent's again for the first time in many years, and to refurbish the Mary Shrine and the Sacred Heart Shrine at St. Catherine's. Thanks to the generosity of some parishioners, our churches have become more beautiful and more inviting for reflective and contemplative prayer and Christian formation. I would love to see more of the Shrines at St. Catherine's be refurbished as well as the refurbishing of the side doors by the Rosary Altar at St. Vincent's. Because of the continued blessing of additional young families, we also need to continue expanding the atriums for the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. Finally, I would like to renovate the Parish Center at St. Vincent's to turn it into a multipurpose room that could provide for the Parish life in a number of ways. Finally, while veiling the statue of the Porta Caeli at St. Vincent's, we noticed that one of Mary's hands needs some restoration work. If you would like to support any of these projects either in small or large ways, please contact Lee Ann in the Parish Office.

Along these lines, one thing that you will see begin over the next few weeks is the renovation of our confessionals at St. Vincent's. After a long wait, this renovation will begin on Easter Monday, and the whole process should be completed by Pentecost. This is an incredible need for the Parish, especially since our confession lines have grown much longer over the course of the past year. What a blessing it is for me and the other Dominicans to hear so many confessions!

I am so grateful to be with you all at this time as the Parish life is becoming an ever more pleasing fragrance of the Lord. May He bless you and your loved ones this Holy Week and Easter Season so that the coming graces of the Resurrection may bear sweet fruit in your souls. Let us keep one another and our Parish in prayer!

On Holy Thursday, the Evening Mass commemorates the Institution of the Holy Eucharist at the Last Supper and the ordination of the Apostles. (No other Mass is celebrated on this day, excepting the Chrism Mass) The Mass of the Lord's Supper is therefore a Mass of joy and thanksgiving. Hence the Church replaces her penitential violet with white; the altar is decorated; and the Gloria in excelsis is sung during which bells are rung for the last time until the Easter Vigil. Also at this Mass, an extra ciborium of hosts, consecrated for Good Friday's Solemn Celebration of the Lord's Passion, is borne in procession to an Altar of Repose. The other altars are stripped, signifying that the holy Sacrifice will not be offered again until the Vigil.

The title "Maundy" Thursday is derived from the ceremony of the washing of feet, the *Mandatum*, so called because of the incipit of an Antiphon sung during that ceremony: *Mandatum novum do vobis* (I give you a new commandment.) (John 13:34). The *Mandatum* takes place on this day because the Lord washed the feet of his

Good Friday is the anniversary of the death and burial of our Lord who, being both High Priest and Victim, offered himself on the cross for the salvation of the world. This day is called "Good" because on it the condescension and goodness of God were exceedingly manifested toward mankind in Christ's self-sacrifice. Its Solemn Liturgy, customarily celebrated at 3 PM, the hour of the Crucifixion, consists of three parts:

- 1. The Liturgy of the Word, including the chanting of the Johannine Passion and the Solemn Intercessions, with supplications made for the Church and the whole human race.
 - 2. The Adoration of the Holy Cross.
- 3. The Holy Communion, with the sacred Host which was consecrated on Holy Thursday. The liturgical color is red. On this and the following day, by a most ancient tradition, the Church does not celebrate the Sacraments at all, except for Penance and the Anointing of the Sick.

Through Holy Saturday the Church waits at the Lord's tomb in prayer and fasting, meditating on his Passion, Death, and descent into Hell, and awaiting his Resurrection. Of this night's Great Vigil, which is the pinnacle of the liturgical year, there is only ever one celebration in each parish. It consists of four parts:

1. The Solemn Entrance (*Lucernarium*), in which the new fire is kindled, the paschal candle is inscribed, the candles of the faithful are lit (*Lumen Christi*), and the Easter Proclamation (*Exsultet*) is sung.

2. The Liturgy of the Word, in which up to eight readings (seven from the Old Testament and one from the New) and a Gospel tell of the relationship between God and his people from the beginning of creation through the Resurrection.

3. The Baptismal Liturgy, in which the Litany of the Saints is sung, the baptismal water is blessed, the Baptismal Promises are renewed, and the Elect are baptized and confirmed.

4. The Liturgy of the Eucharist, as the first paschal Mass of Easter Sunday. The church's best white or gold vestments are worn.
