#### FEAST OF STS. PHILIP AND JAMES

Monday, May 3 is the Feast of Sts. Philip and James, Apostles. There will be Saturday: 3–3:50 рм a Sung Mass and Procession at 6 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer.

#### SOLEMNITY OF ST. VINCENT FERRER

Wednesday, May 5 is the Solemnity of St. Vincent Ferrer and the anniversary of Church's dedication. There will be a Solemn Mass at 6 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer for which the Schola will sing Orlando di Lasso's Missa Bell' Amfitrit' altera; Deus meus in simplicitate cordis mei; and Ecce nunc benedicite *Dominum.* A solemn Te Deum will be sung at the conclusion of the Mass. Wednesday Holy Hour will follow the 6 PM Mass as usual.

The Church of St. Vincent Ferrer, dedicated on May 5, 1918, was built to the designs of renowned American architect Bertram Grosvenor Goodhue, who considered this his finest building. This National Historic Landmark is widely acclaimed as the foremost American example of French Gothic-style architecture and includes a complete set of Charles Connick stained glass windows, carvings by Lee Lawrie, and two instruments by the Schantz Organ Company.

St. Vincent Ferrer's feastday according to the liturgical calendar of the Dominican Order is May 5. In the general Roman Calendar, St. Vincent's feastday is April 5, the day on which he died in 1419.

Next Sunday, May 9, is Mother's Day. There will be a Remembrance Book for all deceased mothers at the Rosary Altar at both Churches.

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#### ASCENSION

Thursday, May 13 is the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, a Holy Day of Obligation. #### **MUSIC NOTES**

Next week, for the Sixth Sunday of Easter, the Schola will sing music of two of the most prolific composers of the Renaissance.

Tulerunt Dominum meum is a Responsory in Eastertide citing Chapter 20 of John's Gospel. The text begins, They have taken away my Lord, and I know not where they have put him, alleluia. The angels say unto her: Woman, why do you weep? He is risen, as he said. He goes before you into Galilee, alleluia. The Schola sang a different version of this text on Easter II by the Italian composer Giovanni Battista della Gostena. This Franco-Flemish setting, although quite different in style, exudes the Easter joy in its own way. The Mass Ordinary is one of Lasso's typical six-part settings, with SSATTB voicing.

### INTEGRITY OF LIFE

For, with the old order destroyed A universe cast down is renewed And integrity of life is restored

To us to Christ

From the Fourth Preface of Easter

Ever since the current English translation of the Roman Missal appeared in 2011, I have enjoyed saying this "Preface" during the Easter season, but I have never thought through, why. No doubt the word "integrity" spoke to me with power; all the more so because the text presents it neither as a possibility nor as a goal, but as a present reality. Given my own struggles to live well, I find this a startling thought.

My dictionary gives me two definitions for integrity. The first is what you might expect: "The quality of being honest and having strong moral principles, morally upright." I suspect this popular sense of the word has its origins in the second definition which is, "The state of being whole and undivided." This deeper and broader sense of the word connects to the expansiveness of the Preface. Indeed, these few lines connect what goes on inside me, what goes on around me, and the order of the whole universe.

What bridges that vast span is the link of integrity to happiness. No doubt the life of sacraments flowing into us from the Risen One, makes it easier for us to satisfy integrity's usual meaning with more principled and consistent behavior. Since virtue provides its own reward, this is a joy. But the Preface refers not to integrity of behavior but

to integrity of life, and herein lies a happiness with eternal potential.

We now find ourselves in the heart of the Easter season. The lilies and jelly beans are gone, and in a series of Gospels the Risen Lord sits with us and prepares for the mysteries of his Ascension and Sending of the Holy Spirit. This is serious and beautiful business, but as the Easter season evolves, Jesus faces stiff competition from weddings, graduations, First Communions, Confirmations, Ordinations, and their anniversaries; all of these draw us in a thousand directions and cause limitless distractions.

If what Jesus makes possible for me is a life whole and undivided, then a spring full of change makes it difficult for me to absorb such a truth, for I am tired and pulled in too many directions. If the Lord has integrity on offer, I would like it to take the form of a simpler, more clearly ordered life. I think of a week possessed of five days of work and two of leisure: I long for workdays that end at 5 PM, and I dream of lunches that last an hour. Finally, if we are serious about integrity of life, then I would like to chuck multitasking in favor of concentration.

Of course my version of integrity looks a lot like nostalgia and sounds a lot like whining. But the Lord of Easter turns our gaze in the opposite direction. In fact, his Resurrection provides the very principle of the new integrity. In the light of the Paschal Candle he offers his new life in glory, shared with us in the sacraments, not just as a reward for good behavior, or as a promise for beyond the grave, but as a reliable foundation for the life we now live, and as a matrix within which all its dimensions may coexist in harmony.

"If Jesus lives...then" becomes for me the new starting point for faith and prayer surely, but also for work and love, money and politics. Effectively the resurrection replaces fear, anxiety, and resentment in the shaping of my

decisions. Now you, reasonably, will request some illustration of this point, and I am happy to oblige.

I will never forget my first Easter in the Order. I happened to be standing next to my Prior at our community party following the Easter Vigil. While we Novices eagerly devoured sweets of any kind, he turned to me and said, "If it weren't for the Resurrection, you would not be here." The truth of his words has unfolded for me over three decades. When I made vows as a Friar, I forsook the reasonable measures most people use to build a way of life that gives stability and companionship. I accepted the eternal life of Jesus as a pattern for happiness in the present, because if He lives, an undefended life becomes possible. Despite a number of challenges along the way I would reaffirm the choice, and confirm the significance of what ensued.

Because Jesus lives I have moved from place to place and from occupation to occupation. I have lived with, and worked with, all kinds of people. I have not chosen a single one of my assignments, but receiving each, I perceived

that I could obey readily because of His life within me.

As a result, in each place, through each work, and with each company of companions I have found a new home to cry over when leaving. At each stage of the journey it has proven harder for me to segregate areas of my life from the impact of the original choice, and so conversion has followed conversion, as connection has followed connection. Ultimately the Resurrection has been for me the agent of a new harmony of life, and I am less divided against myself at 59 than I was at 49 or 39. Mine is one story. But each time a person reports becoming more whole doesn't a universe cast down take fresh delight?

Given the current state of the institutional Church, the vowed life signifies ever more clearly, an embrace of the precarious as a path to the eternal. In that light what could be frightening becomes thrilling, and what could stifle life, gives life.

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
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
