800TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE DEATH OF ST. DOMINIC

Our Holy Father Dominic, the founder of the Order of Preachers, died on August 6, 1221. To mark the 800th Anniversary, the Parish will have several days worth of special celebrations.

On Wednesday, August 4, the traditional feast day of St. Dominic, at 7 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer, the Lay Fraternity of St. Dominic (the Third Order) will celebrate a Rite of Profession in which three of its members will make a Perpetual Profession before Fr. Joseph Allen, O.P., Religious Promoter of the Lay Fraternity Chapter.

At 7:30 PM, immediately following the Profession, there will be a *Missa Cantata* Mass in the Dominican Rite for the feast day of St. Dominic. The Schola Cantorum will sing *Missa in honorem Sancti Dominici*, Op. 66, a setting by 20th century English composer Edmund Rubbra who converted to Catholicism on St. Dominic's Day, 1947. Parishioners are most welcome to both the Rite and the Mass.

Sunday, August 8 is the Solemnity of St. Dominic according to the modern liturgical calendar. There will be a Solemn Mass at 12 noon at St. Vincent Ferrer as usual, which will be followed by a reception with light refreshments in the Parish Hall. All other Masses that weekend will also celebrate the Solemnity.

From August 4–8, relics of St. Dominic will be displayed for veneration in the sepulchre by the Rosary Altar at St. Vincent Ferrer. A Parish holy card, printed for the Anniversary, will be available and will be a fruitful means to ask the Lord's blessings through the intercession of Our Holy Father St. Dominic.

TRANSFIGURATION

Friday, August 6 is the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord. There will be a Sung Mass at 6 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer.

ASSUMPTION

August 15, Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, falls on a Sunday this year and therefore displaces the 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time. All Masses that weekend, including the Solemn Mass at 12 NOON, will celebrate the Assumption.

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MUSIC NOTES

The Year B Lectionary offers the "Bread of Life Discourse" as the Gospel for the Seventeenth through Twentieth Sundays of Ordinary Time. (This year, because the Solemnities of St. Dominic and of the Assumption of Our Lady fall on Sundays, only the Seventeenth and Eighteenth Sundays in Ordinary Time will be celebrated as such.)

Hans Leo Hassler was the first of many German composers of the period to study in Venice where he befriended Giovanni Gabrieli and studied with his uncle, Andrea Gabrieli. He returned to Germany late in 1585 where he worked as a composer and an organist. His final appointment was in Dresden as *Kapellmeister* to the Elector Christian II of Saxony, succeeded by Michael Praetorious and Heinrich Schütz. Although a Protestant, much of Hassler's music, including the Cantiones sacrae book of motets and a book of Masses, was written for the Roman liturgy.

THE WINDOWS OF ST. VINCENT FERRER CHURCH

As is customary during the summer months, we will offer historical information about the Church of St. Vincent Ferrer. Our summer series this year will focus on the windows in the church.

The great clerestory windows of the nave were designed by Charles Connick and installed between 1934 and 1940. All of the clerestory windows in St. Vincent Ferrer Church have been planned to complement each other. A counter-change of reds and blues is arranged so that the windows with dominant blues function beautifully in direct sunlight, with the opposite windows having warm reds and golds. This creates a constant changing and fascinating fusion of jeweled light and shadow across the Nave and the front of the church. These windows are the largest, except for the chancel windows. As the chief source of light in the church, they are designed in brilliant, clear color.

Each of the windows of the Nave represents a Dominican Saint. They are pictured with two other persons with whom they were associated. For example, St. Albert the Great, famous for his work as a natural scientist and philosopher, is pictured with the great thinker Aristotle and St. John the Evangelist. Scenes of the life of the Saint complete the window. The base inscriptions are alternated in Latin and English. Latin is used where other saintly characters are introduced, and English where all are Dominican characters.


The following plan provides the sequence of the windows of the Nave. The numbers in front of the titles of each window give a clue to the order in which they are introduced to the visitor of St. Vincent Ferrer. This week we will introduce the window of St. Raymond of Peñafort. A description of the window follows.

CLERESTORY WINDOW OF ST. ROSE OF LIMA

From the rear of the nave, facing the altar and looking up, the first window on the right is dedicated to the first flower of sanctity in the Americas, St. Rose of Lima with Blessed Jane of Portugal and the young Blessed Imelda Lambertini, contrasting characters emphasizing, with the first American Saint, the wide reaches of the Order and its

comprehensiveness. The window was installed on August 30, 1940.

St. Rose of Lima is portrayed in the central lancet, attired in the habit of the Third Order of St. Dominic and the Crown of Roses. St. Rose was not a sister or a nun living a secluded life within the cloistered walls of a convent, but a tertiary living in the world. She had set a cloister around her heart and did not permit the distractions of the world to violate the sacred precincts of that cloister. She bears symbols of the Passion (cross) and Purity (lily). Around her waist is the padlocked chain of her self-chastisement. The devil at the feet of St. Rose symbolizes temptation. Her sufferings were not only bodily but emotional, as she experienced all the mental anguish of what is known as the "dark night of the soul." Above is the symbol of the Infant Christ encircled by roses, recalling her visions of the Saviour; below is the flaming rose.

The upper medallion is a symbol of the spiritual espousal that took place on Palm Sunday. St. Rose and other Tertiaries had gathered in the Church of Santo Domingo for the solemn services. Through an oversight, the sacristan failed to give the palm branches to St. Rose. When the procession formed, she took her accustomed place with the other Tertiaries, accusing herself of having too eagerly desired the palm branch. As the procession passed the statue of the Queen of the Holy Rosary, she begged for pardon. The statue became animated and smiled. The

Infant in the arms of Our Lady spoke to St. Rose, "Rose of My heart, be thou My Spouse."

Realizing the greatness of this favor and her own unworthiness, St. Rose modestly bowed her head and promised eternal fidelity to her heavenly suitor. (It will be noted that the three little figures in this medallion bear palms.) Encircling the miraculous statue of the Queen of the Most Holy Rosary, are the symbols of the mysteries of the Rosary: five white beads for the Joyful, five ruby beads for the Sorrowful, and five gold beads for the Glorious

Mysteries.

The smaller central medallion is a symbol of the self-immolation of St. Rose during the Peruvian Rebellion. When she was about 25 years old, the native Peruvians rebelled against their Spanish conquerors, withdrew to the wilds, and reverted to their former savagery and idolatry. Under these disheartening conditions, St. Rose appealed to heaven by her prayers and penances. She scourged her body and pleaded with her Divine Spouse to accept this self-immolation and restore peace to the stricken community. Her prayers and sacrifices were not in vain. The rebellious people returned to their former allegiance, and peace was once again restored. The symbols of the Peruvian and Spanish soldiers are seen at each side of this medallion.

The lower medallion represents St. Rose's choice of the Dominican Order over the Carmelite. One day she went to the Rosary Altar of the Dominican church to bid Our Lady farewell. As she was about to leave the altar, she discovered that she was unable to move from the spot. The efforts of her brother to help her were of no avail. From this strange phenomenon, St. Rose concluded that Our Lady was indicating to her that she was to remain in the world as a Tertiary. As soon as this decision was made, the mysterious forces were released and Rose was able to return home. She was received into the Third Order before that very altar by her confessor, Father Velasquez. In this medallion our Divine Savior is offering to St. Rose the Dominican Arms in contrast to the Carmelite Arms proffered by her wealthy friend, Don Gonzales de Massa.

The lancet on the left depicts Blessed Jane of Portugal. She wears the veil of the Second Order of Dominicans and holds the distaff for spinning linen thread with which she made corporals. At her feet are the Arms of Portugal with its five small shields, each charged with symbols of the wounds of Christ. It is surrounded by the Crown of

Thorns, which Blessed Jane added to her Arms.

The small central medallion is a symbol of her government of the kingdom, while her father and brother were fighting the Moors. She was distinguished for her abundant almsgiving. The lower medallion symbolizes the incident when Blessed Jane caused herself, although ill and suffering, to be carried to the chapel to assist in the adoration of the Cross.

The lancet on the right depicts Blessed Imelda Lambertini, Patroness of First Communicants. She also wears the veil of the Second Order and points to the symbol on her breast, the Blessed Sacrament in her heart. At her feet

is a symbol of Calvary, which she erected in a corner of her garden, and surrounded with flowers.

The small central medallion is a symbol of Blessed Imelda's charity to the poor, especially to the Mendicant Orders. The lower medallion is a symbol of young Imelda's First Communion, on which occasion the radiant Host miraculously appeared over her head. So great was her joy on receiving the Eucharist that she breathed forth her pure soul into the hands of her Eucharistic Lord. "Tell me, how is it possible to receive Jesus into one's heart and not to die?" she would frequently say to her Religious Sisters.

In the principal tracery members are symbols of the Aztec standards: the sun (a Dominican convent was erected on the site of the Temple of the Sun), balanced by the sun as a Christian symbol, bearing a sacred monogram. Above are the llama and cinchona tree from the Arms of Peru.

Across the base of the panel is the text: "Rose of the Indies emits a Sweet Odor."

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
