PARISH OUTREACH

As New York City and the Archdiocese of New York continue to reopen our parish has resumed in-person Masses following the regulations of the Archdiocese. The regulations allow us to have gatherings in church at 25% capacity. Since it is summer, and since many have left the city, we think we will be safe having our **regular schedule of Masses** with proper precautions observed. Likewise, **regular confessions** can now be heard as usual, provided we maintain social distance in the confession line.

For Masses we will need to observe the following:

- We need to wear a mask, or its equivalent, in church.
- We practice social distancing as indicated by the markers.
- We make frequent use of the hand sanitizer provided.
- The churches will be cleaned between masses.
- Please follow instructions for the distribution of Holy Communion that will be given at the Mass.

SOLEMNITY OF ST. DOMINIC

Saturday, August 8 is the Solemnity of St. Dominic, the founder of the Order of Preachers. There will be a Solemn Mass at 9 AM at St. Catherine of Siena (which will also be webcast), and for it the Schola Cantorum will sing music from the Franco-Flemish Renaissance: Philippe de Monte's *Missa Quomodo dilexi* and Orlando di Lasso's *Salve Regina á 6* (1604a).

St. Lawrence

Monday, August 10 is the Feast of St. Lawrence, Deacon and Martyr. There will be a Sung Mass at 6 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer.

ASSUMPTION

St. Dominic

This week pay a visit to St. Vincent Ferrer's Church and check out the places where you can find St. Dominic, the founder of the Dominican Order. The references below will help you in your sleuthing. They are from our 1944 book on the church, which we are in the process of editing, updating, and re-publishing. It will give us a whole new enjoyment of something so familiar.

Start your discovery at the Lexington Avenue entrance. Before you enter the church, take a look at the beautiful exterior carvings. Directly above the oak doors is St. Vincent Ferrer. To the right of St. Vincent is the statue of St. Dominic. Above St. Dominic's niche is carved an ornate canopy, which is supported by the dog with a torch in his mouth and the devil's head with a hand holding a candle.

The tympanum, or semi-circle, over the entrance, contains a set of nine carved scenes from the lives of St. Francis, St. Vincent, and St. Dominic. Starting on the bottom right and moving up the scenes referring to St. Dominic are:

- 1. Dominic delivering his last will and testament to the surrounding brethren
- 2. Dominic receiving the Rosary from the Blessed Virgin
- 3. Dominic preaching before the Papal household
- 4. Dominic consoling the poor and afflicted.

Enter the church and walk down the main aisle. One of the most striking features of St. Vincent Ferrer are the magnificent stained-glass windows. Each window with its distinctive motif reviews pictorially the principal events in the lives of illustrious sons and daughters of St. Dominic. St. Dominic is featured in several windows, notably the Great Rose window. At the heart of the rose, the ruby winged seraphim encircle the figure of St. Dominic. He is at the center knot of a trefoil of a six-cusped section of tracery. In the six cusps are the six seraphim, who form the most exalted of the angelic choirs and who symbolize divine love. St. Dominic's symbols are the lily, typifying his purity of life, and the Rosary. St. Dominic occupies the central spot with his family of Dominican saints surrounding him.

St. Dominic is also featured in the Windows over the confessionals on the right, or south side, of the church. The first set of windows on the left feature St. Dominic:

Upper left: St. Dominic tries to sell himself as a slave to the Moors.

Lower left: St. Dominic selling his books to relieve the poor

Upper right: St. Dominic passing through Toulouse

Lower right: In the city of Bezieres, Dominic intercedes for the women and children whose lives are threatened

by the soldiers.

The next set of windows:

Upper left: The dream of Pope Honorius III. St. Dominic is holding up the falling Church.

Lower left: The meeting of St. Dominic and St. Francis

Upper right: The raising of a boy by St. Dominic. The horse and fallen rider are seen in the background

The choir stalls and the High Altar offer another opportunity to view St. Dominic.

Choir Stall: The Prior's stall on the left, back row, contains the coat of arms of St. Dominic featuring the beads, dog, crown, lily, and star, all symbols of St. Dominic.

Tabernacle: On the left side, under the canopy of the Tabernacle, is St. Dominic with a star above his head and a book in his hand. Beneath him is the Dominican shield.

Reredos: On the second row from the bottom of the reredos are six Dominican Saints. The second saint from the left is St. Dominic. His symbol is an open book.

Stepping over to the **Rosary Altar**, St. Dominic is portrayed in the center panel receiving the Rosary from the hands of the Blessed Virgin. Cherubs are in the upper left; the brown and white dog with a torch in its mouth, another symbol of St. Dominic, is in the lower right.

It may not be so easy to view the many references to St. Dominic displayed in the Friars' Chapel. It was designed to be used by the Dominican priests and brothers for chanting of the Divine Office. The chapel is dedicated to St. Dominic. He appears in two of the Chapel's three stained glass windows and is also symbolized by the presentation of the dog holding a torch in its mouth.

There are two exquisite wood carvings at the entrance in the upper corners. On the left side is St. Dominic with a lily and book, symbols of his purity and wisdom. Inside the chapel six Dominican figures support the roof. St. Dominic is on the left side.

The altar in this chapel is dedicated to St. Dominic. In the altar stone is the relic of St. Dominic. The richly decorated wall behind the altar contains symbols of St. Dominic: the crown, indicating his royal lineage, and the dog and torch, symbols of the order he founded.

The Rosary window is divided into 3 lancets. It portrays the Blessed Virgin holding her Child and giving the Rosary to St. Dominic.

Friars Chapel windows:

St. Dominic and St. Thomas Aquinas are companion figures in the window on the right side nearest the altar. St. Dominic, on the left lancet, holds his traditional symbols, a book and lilies. In the background appear his eight-pointed star and the dog holding a torch, a symbol associated with the dream of his mother, Blessed Joan of Aza. Below, under the words "Go preach the Word of God," is the figure of St. Dominic instructing his disciples before sending them throughout the world.

When leaving the church, stop by The Holy Name Chapel. On the right is a statue of St. Dominic.

Next week, for the 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Schola will sing two motets from the Italian and Spanish Renaissance.

MUSIC DURING REOPENING

During the quarantine, we were able to continue offering music at Mass via our webcast. With the resumption of public worship in the archdiocese, it is a joy to once again provide live sacred music. In accordance with archdiocesan guidelines, here are several notes on liturgical music in the parish as we move through these phases of reopening.

Usually during the time between Corpus Christi and Holy Cross Day (September 14), the Schola Cantorum goes on its summer holiday, and the 12 NOON Mass is with a cantor only. Because a third of its season was lost to the quarantine, a small ensemble from the Schola will be offering polyphony at the 12 NOON Mass this summer. Even if you do not attend this Mass in person,

please do tune-in to the webcast to hear the our Schola.

The leaflet provided for Mass must be limited to one sheet of paper. **Please take it with you after Mass.** Those left in the pews or returned to the baskets after Mass cannot be reused.

Congregational singing is to be limited. Therefore, we are omitting the Post-Communion Hymn.

Although music for it is not included in the leaflet, the congregation is still welcome to sing the *Roman Missal Mass*, the setting of the Mass Ordinary (*Kyrie*, *Gloria*, etc.) used during Ordinary Time, the *Pater noster*, and other dialogical responses.

The Responsorial Psalm is the almost-universally used option for that which comes between the readings. However, the *Responsorium* (also known as the *Gradual*) is the more ancient choice, which is sung by the cantor or Schola alone. While it often uses a different text than the one appointed for the Responsorial Psalm (for those consulting a hand missal or copy of *Magnificat*), it still compliments the rest of the lectionary, accommodates the restrictions on congregational singing, and exposes the faithful to an exceptionally beautiful yet all-to-rarely heard genre of chant.
