PARISH COVID PROTOCOLS

Our parish has resumed in-person Masses following the regulations of the Archdiocese of New York and New York City. The regulations allow us to have gatherings in church at 25% capacity. We have resumed our regular schedule of Masses with proper precautions observed. Regular confessions can now be heard as usual, provided we maintain social distance in the confession line.

For Masses we will need to observe the following:

- We need to wear a mask, or its equivalent, in church.
- We practice social distancing as indicated by the markers.
- We make frequent use of the hand sanitizer provided.
- The churches will be cleaned between masses.
- Please follow instructions for the distribution of Holy Communion that will be given at the Mass.

LABOR DAY SCHEDULE

In observance of Labor Day, the Parish Offices will be closed on Monday, September 7. There will only be two Low Masses offered in the Parish: at 7 AM at St. Catherine of Siena and at 9 AM at St. Vincent Ferrer. No Confessions will be heard and the churches will close following the Masses.

NATIVITY OF MARY

Tuesday, September 8 is the Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. There will be a Sung Mass at 6 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer. There are only three nativities observed in the Roman Catholic calendar: for Jesus, for Mary, and for St. John the Baptist.

REQUIEM MASS ON 9/11

On Friday, September 11, a sung Requiem Mass in the Dominican Rite at 7 PM will be offered at St. Vincent Ferrer. The Schola Cantorum will sing Antonio Lotti's *Missa pro defunctis á 4*. This Mass, sponsored by the New York Purgatorial Society, will be offered in particular memory on the 19th anniversary for those who died in 2001.

EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS-OUR LADY OF SORROWS

Monday, September 14 is the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross and Tuesday, September 15 is the Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows. There will be a Sung Mass at St. Catherine of Siena at 5:15 PM on both evenings.

There will be Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament on Monday and Tuesday following the 7 AM Mass and concluding before the 5:15 PM Mass

One of two such periods of extended adoration offered annually in the Parish, this one is offered for the intentions for those suffering in the hospitals and for those who care for them. The other, at St. Vincent Ferrer, marks the beginning of the liturgical year on the first weekend of Advent.

Food services including hot meals and brown bag meals are available seven days a week. Nutrition education provides lessons on healthful eating, nutrition and active living for adults and their families. In addition, counseling and referral services to acquire benefits and entitlements are available to families.

JESUS AND MARY ON CALVARY

This letter carries the hope that you have come through these months of pandemic with health in body and with peace of mind. Responding to the virus has affected the rhythms of the year. I write these lines in early August, at what should be "going back to school" time. This came to be its own shopping season, replete with traffic increases and enticing markdowns. But now we are not sure what "back to school" will mean; remote or in person, and if in person for how many days a week? A silver lining in this confusion might be that summer will sneak on past Labor Day toward its natural conclusion. This would be a dividend we could use.

If this September is less hectic than most, perhaps you would contribute a little of it to an initiative of prayer which will be new for us and, we hope, timely for you. This year we will hold eight days of prayer in honor of our Lord's Cross and our Lady's stance at the foot of it. This octave will begin on Tuesday, September 8, the feast of Our Lady's Nativity, and conclude on Tuesday, September 15, the feast of Our Lady of Sorrows. Of course, these days will have as a high point the great feast of the triumph of the Holy Cross on Monday, September 14.

We will offer this time of prayer for patients and caregivers, those who suffer and those who suffer with.

Taken together the feasts of Jesus and Mary on Calvary capture a crucial truth of human life and reveal how God's intervention has transformed it. He has come to meet us at the point of our powerlessness so that we might experience his power to save and to free.

We find the point of our power in our capacity to accomplish. Completing a task or realizing a dream brings us to that human high point where we can affect the world for the better and fulfill our potential. Accomplishment enters conversion when we use drive and talent to foster the gifts of another. Is there any substitute for the sense of accomplishment parents experience when their children accomplish?

Achievement draws on initiative, imagination, and discipline, and so demands a context of freedom. We rack up accomplishments in our jobs and relationships, and so it may seem that obligation drives us, but in the end no outside force can exercise our faculties for us.

Succeeding and failing, and struggling to achieve tells a lot of our story and builds a lot of our self-image. So, a dreadful shock comes when we cannot achieve for ourselves but become the recipients of achievement, the initiative of our neighbors and the works of God. Sickness, aging, and dying bring us to this point of passivity, as does our helplessness before the plight of others. Here we encounter an impotence that appears to rob us of humanity itself until we recognize it as part of humanity and befriend it as part of God's creation.

Jesus crucified and his Mother suffering beside him show us the pain of the hour of our passion (undergoing) and of our compassion (undergoing with). They also reveal the amazing potential of these moments in the working of God's grace.

In moments of passion and compassion we enter dead ends of human life from which we naturally try to escape by flight or by fight: we avoid our suffering, or that of another, either by fixing it or running away from it. We know that we have reached our "hour" when neither is possible. We find ourselves in a trip that will elicit rage and frustration, resignation and denial - all most human. But if we can recognize this time as something God allows as a real part of our being human and being with other humans, then such a terrible cul de sac becomes a privileged time of prayer and trust that refines our charity.

In these Covid days those who suffer and those who suffer with have taken a place at the center of our consciousness, and we find ourselves newly aware of the singularity of the hour of passion and compassion. In a way, the isolation of Covid sufferers, and the barriers placed between them and their caregivers, points the eyes of faith to their closeness with God.

Our octave of prayer will be a time to remember those we know on beds of suffering and those standing beside them. Our petitions will recognize their loneliness and fear, their frustration and anxiety, their transformation and growth in love.

As always there will an octave shrine, with holy cards and petition slips, in each of our churches of St. Catherine of Siena and St. Vincent Ferrer. The prayer of the octave will be said at each mass in our parish.

We hope this prayer will offer a witness of faith in the medical community where we find ourselves. Thank you for joining us.
