

The Cantor sings the Alleluia; then all repeat it.

The Schola continues through the jubilus (tail) of the Alleluia and sings the Verse, after which the Alleluia is repeated by all.

V. Herod, sending an executioner, commanded that the head of John [the Baptist] should be cut off in prison.





GOSPEL *Mark* 6:17-29

Herod was the one who had John the Baptist arrested and bound in prison on account of Herodias, the wife of his brother Philip, whom he had married. John had said to Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." Herodias harbored a grudge against him and wanted to kill him but was unable to do so. Herod feared John, knowing him to be a righteous and holy man, and kept him in custody. When he heard him speak he was very much perplexed, yet he liked to listen to him. She had an opportunity one day when Herod, on his birthday, gave a banquet for his courtiers, his military officers, and the leading men of Galilee. Herodias' own daughter came in and performed a dance that delighted Herod and his guests. The king said to the girl, "Ask of me whatever you wish and I will grant it to you." He even swore many things to her, "I will grant you whatever you ask of me, even to half of my kingdom." She went out and said to her mother, "What shall I ask for?" She replied, "The head of John the Baptist." The girl hurried back to the king's presence and made her request, "I want you to give me at once on a platter the head of John the Baptist." The king was deeply distressed, but because of his oaths and the guests he did not wish to break his word to her. So he promptly dispatched an executioner with orders to bring back his head. He went off and beheaded him in the prison. He brought in the head on a platter and gave it to the girl. The girl in turn gave it to her mother. When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body and laid it in a tomb.


PRAYER OVER THE OFFERINGS

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PREFACE




It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, Lord, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Christ our Lord.

And so, with the Powers of heaven, we worship you constantly on earth, and before your majesty without end we acclaim:



ANNIVERSARY OF DEDICATION

On August 29, 1897, the Archbishop of New York, Michael Corrigan, conducted the dedication ceremonies of the first Church of St. Catherine of Siena. This included a grand procession from St. Vincent Ferrer with over 1,000 members of the Holy Name Society, dozens of Dominican friars, and many diocesan priests of the neighborhood. The large three-story brick building, with a sanctuary capable of accommodating 900 parishioners, served as a chapel to St. Vincent Ferrer until 1916, when an independent priory and parish were established.

The chapel was created through the efforts of Fr. Patrick V. Hartigan, O.P., the Prior and Pastor of St. Vincent Ferrer, to accommodate the large number of faithful living in the north-east quadrant of the parish. Placing the chapel under the patronage of St. Catherine of Siena was the suggestion of Abp. Corrigan, who had a great devotion to her.

St. Catherine of Siena had a school, run by the Dominican Sisters of Sparkhill, which opened in 1906 and closed in 1992. The current church was designed by Wilfrid Anthony, Bertram Goodhue's assistant, and was dedicated in 1931. The old school, convent, and priory were sold to Memorial Sloan Kettering in 1996 and the new priory building was opened in 2008. The parish of St. Catherine of Siena was merged back with St. Vincent Ferrer in 2015.
