

FIRST READING Acts 10:34a, 37-43

Peter proceeded to speak and said: "You know what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree. This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all the people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead. To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name."

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GOSPEL John 20:1-9

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him." So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in. When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.

RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL PROMISES

Dear brethren through the Paschal Mystery we have been buried with Christ in Baptism, so that we may walk with him in newness of life. And so, now that our Lenten observance is concluded, let us renew the promises of Holy Baptism, by which we once renounced Satan and his works and promised to serve God in the holy Catholic Church. And so I ask you:

Do you renounce Satan? I do.

And all his works? I do.

And all his empty show? I do.

Do you believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth? I do.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was born of the Virgin Mary, suffered death and was buried, rose again from the dead and is seated at the right hand of the Father? *I do.*

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting? *I do*.

And may almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us new birth by water and the Holy Spirit and bestowed on us forgiveness of our sins, keep us by his grace, in Christ Jesus our Lord, for eternal life. *Amen*.






ASPERSION RITE

MUSIC NOTES

The Parish Schola Cantorum is joined today by Piffaro, the Renaissance Band. They offer historically informed performances of music from the late Medieval, Renaissance and early Baroque periods, in the manner of the civic, court, and chapel wind bands, which existed roughly between the years 1450-1650. Today, four players are using soprano recorders, a tenor shawm, a sackbut, and dulcians, all careful reconstructions of instruments from the period. Under the direction of Artistic Director Priscilla Herreid, Piffaro present an annual concert series in Philadelphia that also reaches an international audience online; tour throughout the United States, Europe, Canada and South America; and appear as performers and instructors at major Early Music festivals.

Welcome to the Parish of St. Vincent Ferrer and St. Catherine of Siena in the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of New York, served by the Dominican Friars of the Province of St. Joseph. The Church of St. Vincent Ferrer, dedicated on May 5, 1918, was built to the designs of renowned American architect Bertram Grosvenor Goodhue, who considered this his finest building. This National Historic Landmark is widely acclaimed as the foremost American example of French Gothic-style architecture and includes a complete set of Charles Connick stained glass windows, carvings by Lee Lawrie, and two instruments by the Schantz Organ Company.

SOLEMN VESPERS ON EASTER SUNDAY

Solemn Paschal Vespers will be celebrated today at 5 PM for which the Schola Cantorum will sing *Magnificat Primi Toni á* 8 and *Regina caeli á* 8 by Spanish Renaissance composer Tomás Luis de Victoria. Please consider making this part of your Easter celebrations. "When evening came on that day, the first day of the week...Jesus stood in their midst and said to them: 'Peace be with you, alleluia.'" (John 20:19; Antiphon to the Magnificat of Second Vespers of Easter).

MASSES OF EASTER WEEK

The Octave of Easter, also known as Easter Week, is the eight-day period of celebration that runs from Easter Sunday through Low Sunday and marks the beginning of Eastertide. There will be a Sung Mass at 6 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer Monday-Friday (April 1-5).

LOW SUNDAY ORGAN RECITAL AND ADORATION

On April 7, the Second Sunday of Easter, also known as Low Sunday or Divine Mercy Sunday, the Parish's Director of Music James Wetzel will offer an organ recital at 2 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer. Immediately following, Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament will be offered at St. Vincent Ferrer, with Exposition and the Chaplet of Divine Mercy at 3 PM, and Benediction at 4:30 PM. Confessions will also be heard from 3-4 PM. Adoration at St. Catherine of Siena from 3-5 PM will also be offered as usual.

EASTERTIDE LESSONS AND CAROLS

On Sunday, April 21, at 3 PM at St. Catherine of Siena, there will be a Service of Eastertide Lessons and Carols. This hour-long celebration of the will consist of a sequence of scripture readings, motets sung by the Schola Cantorum, and congregational hymns.
