



# **GOSPEL** Luke 24:35-48

The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread.

While they were still speaking about this, he stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." But they were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost. Then he said to them, "Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me and see, because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have." And as he said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While they were still incredulous for joy and were amazed, he asked them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of baked fish; he took it and ate it in front of them.

He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. And he said to them, "Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

Felix Mendelssohn was a German Romantic composer, pianist, organist, conductor, and grandson of philosopher Moses Mendelssohn. He was recognized as a musical prodigy and enjoyed a reputation as virtuosic keyboardist and conductor. As a composer of the first order, his best-known works include a suite of incidental music to *A Midsummer Night's* Dream (including the famous Wedding March), the oratorios *Elijah* and *Paulus*, the *Italian Symphony* and *Scottish Symphony*, and a number of overtures, concertos, chamber works, organ and piano music, and songs. Mendelssohn was influential in reviving the music of his musical forefather Johann Sebastian Bach, beginning with a performance of the *St. Matthew Passion* in 1829. In comparison to his contemporaries such as Liszt, Wagner, and Berlioz, Mendelssohn's music is conservative, and therefore was neglected after his death until relatively recently.

Choral music at next Sunday's Solemn Mass for the Fourth Sunday of Easter (Good Shepherd Sunday): *Missa Surge propera* by Orlando di Lasso; *Deus, Deus meus* by Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina; *and Surrexit pastor bonus* by Jean l'Héritier.



On Sunday, April 21, at 3 PM at St. Catherine of Siena, there will be a Service of Eastertide Lessons and Carols. This hour-long celebration of the will consist of a sequence of scripture readings, motets sung by the Schola Cantorum, and congregational hymns.
