

GOSPEL John 12:20-33

Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. But early in the morning he arrived again in the temple area, and all the people started coming to him, and he sat down and taught them. Then the scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery and made her stand in the middle. They said to him, "Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery. Now in the law, Moses commanded us to stone such women. So what do you say?" They said this to test him, so that they could have some charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and began to write on the ground with his finger. But when they continued asking him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." Again he bent down and wrote on the ground. To receive Holy Communion on the tongue, please use the Communion line at the altar rail.


To receive Holy Communion in the hand, please use the Communion line in the center aisle of the Nave.

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



The final part of the season of Lent is Passiontide, from the Fifth Sunday of Lent, known as "Passion Sunday" until the Triduum. The liturgy during this time focuses on and commemorates the sorrowful events of the last week of Jesus' mortal life.

During this fortnight of "deep Lent," violet veils traditionally cover crosses (until the end of the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday) and cover images and statues until the Gloria of the Easter Vigil. The veiling was associated with the Gospel (John 8:46-59) formerly read on Lent V, in which Jesus "hid himself" from the people (*Jesus autem abscondebat se*). Since the revision of the Roman Calendar in 1969, the name Passiontide is no longer formally used, although the Preface called "Passion of the Lord I (The Power of the Cross)" is used in the fifth week of Lent.

MUSIC NOTES

Probably born in Cambridgeshire, Christopher Tye studied at Cambridge where in 1537 he became a lay clerk (singer) in the choir of King's College. By 1543, he had been appointed Magister Choristarum (choirmaster) at Ely Cathedral and was awarded a doctorate in music from Cambridge in 1545. He is noted as the music teacher of King Edward VI. After becoming a priest in the Church of England and being appointed rector of the church in Doddington, Cambridgeshire, which had the richest benefice in England, he ceased composing. He wrote the hymn tune Winchester Old, usually sung to the text "While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks."

As is the case with most Sarum Rite Masses (that is, Masses written for the Roman Catholic usage in England before the Reformation), *Peterhouse Mass* does not set a Kyrie.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The Stations of the Cross is prayed every Friday during Lent after the evening Masses: 5:15 PM St. Catherine of Siena and 6 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer.
