



FIRST READING Proverbs 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31

GOSPEL Matthew 25:14-30







To receive Holy Communion on the tongue, please use the Communion line at the altar rail.





MUSIC NOTES

Vigilate, published in 1589, was likely written as an extra-liturgical piece for the Chapel Royal. The madrigalisms (text-painting, such as the spirited ascending scale for the crowing cock at 'an galli cantu' and slow harmonic rhythm for the sleep-laden 'dormientes') as well as the overall extroverted nature of the piece suggest that this motet was written without concern for the ever-encroaching Anglican influence on music in the chapel.

ST. CECILIA

Wednesday, November 22 is the Memorial of St. Cecilia, Virgin Martyr. Because she is the patron saint of music and musicians, there will be a Solemn Mass at 6 PM at St. Vincent Ferrer for which the Schola Cantorum will sing *Missa Filiae Jerusalem á 5* by Tiburtio Massaino; *Afferentur regi virgines* by Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina; and *Cantantibus organis* by Bernadino Morelli.

NEXT SUNDAY'S PONTIFICAL MASS AND PROCESSION

Sunday, November 26 is the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, the final Sunday of the liturgical year. The Most Reverend Gerardo J. Colacicco, Auxiliary Bishop of New York will celebrate the 12 NOON Pontifical Mass at St. Vincent Ferrer for which the Schola will sing *Missa Brevis in C Major*, K. 258, 'Piccolomini-Messe' by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart; *Benedictus Deus Israel* by Claudio Merulo; and *Omnes gentes plaudite – Psallite Deo* nostro by Hieronymus Praetorius.

Following the Mass, there will be a Eucharistic Procession down Fifth Avenue to St. Patrick's Cathedral, where Bp. Colacicco will offer the final Benediction. All are encouraged to attend.
